

I dedicate this book to Rev. Fr Christy Griffin for his love of Scartaglin and who is consider him to be the greatest promoter of Gaelic Football in the parish of Scartaglin right through his life. He once stated to his mother 'That a day out of Scartaglin was like a day out of his life' of course this would have been due to his missionary work abroad and he would have been absent from his family for long periods of time.

An appreciation

The late Fr Christy Griffin of Scartaglin was well known in America. His best work was done there. He belonged neither to parish nor diocese, but constantly moved among the communities of Irish wherever they had settled in the great cities — New York, Chicago and Philadelphia. He did this for close on a quarter of a century but it was not, however, the way he planned to spend his life. When he was ordained a priest of St Patrick's Missionary Society in 1950 he was appointed to the missions in Nigeria.

For two years he struggled manfully to cope with the climate and the difficult conditions of missionary life at that time. It was no good. He had to come home and never went back to the missions.

However "God never closes one door but he opens another" and a new opportunity presented. The time had come to seek in America, especially among those of Irish descent, spiritual and financial support for the missionary work of the St Patrick Fathers. So Fr. Christy, with his short but

intense experience in Nigeria, was asked to pioneer and promote a new programme of missionary awareness in the United States. He knew it would not be easy and there was no one to show him the way. He would be an itinerant priest among immigrant people and would never have a church or presbytery of his own. But his quiet charm together with his capacity to lead and inspire great loyalty soon won him many friends and willing helpers for his own work. He became known and loved in many places and a welcome guest in many homes. In New York where Mike Bourke had a bookshop and Tommy and Mary Cullen kept a guesthouse he made a wide circle of friends many of them from Kerry and the townlands around Castleisland.

In those early days he founded the St Patrick Guilds that so many young girls, newly arrived from Ireland, were glad to join. With Fr Griffin they found in these Guilds a spiritual and cultural security and a sense of sharing in the great tradition of Irish Missionary work. Apart from fund-raising activities organising cards, raffles, dances etc. – time was always found for regular retreats and occasional outings to the Catskill Mountains. The Guilds are now gone, but the girls who once gave so generously of their time and energy are the married women who to this day still support the St Patrick Mission Committees throughout the United States.

His love of Gaelic games led him inevitably to Gaelic Park, New York, where his wide knowledge of players and playing skills soon gave him the status of a familiar father figure. Patrons of the games and visiting officials

discussed with him the organisation of games and tours. In 1963 Michael O'Hehir was his Guest of Honour at one of the dances organised in New York. There also in 1965 he successfully made the case for the independence of the Scartaglin Club with the then Chairman of the Kerry County Board, Dr Jim Brosnan who later remarked "What an extraordinary place to make such a request."

He helped to accommodate the Kerry team on the American leg of their great World Tour in 1970, and some would say he paved the way for the first of the All-Stars Tours that took place on the following year. His interest in Gaelic games was very extensive and he was never a man of just one club or one county. Although not a good player himself (by his own admission) he was prepared to help out whenever a team was short and once played with Cavan in Philadelphia.

His annual holiday in Ireland was always arranged to coincide with the final in Croke Park irrespective of what County teams were playing. His allegiance to all cultural and patriotic causes was well established in America and he proudly walked each year with different Irish organisations in the St Patrick's Day parade. It was little wonder when Fr Christy Griffin finally succumbed to a lingering illness; in the Bon Secours Home Tralee that New York Radio announced his death and many of the city's newspapers paid their tributes.

In the parish of Glin Co Limerick where he served as curate towards the end, even as his health declined, the people also held him in very deep esteem. They were present in great numbers at his obsequies together with Bishop Jeremiah Newman and the clergy of Limerick.

Scartaglin church was crowded when Bishop Diarmuid O'Suílleabhain concelebrated Mass with the priests of Kerry, and the entire community shared their sorrow and sympathy with his mother Mrs Kathleen Griffin and sister Mr Pauline McCarthy (all now deceased). As the cortege moved away from Scartaglin someone remembered to take a little earth from the G.A.A. Sportsfield that Fr Christy helped to develop to place on his grave among the Wicklow Hills, in Kiltegan, Co Wicklow.

"It is right that the remains of the late Fr Christy Griffin should return to Kiltegan. It is fitting that he should be buried out from this college out from this chapel. He more than most, contributed to these buildings" so said Fr Vincent MacNamara, Vicar General of St Patrick's Missionary Society, as he introduced the Concelebrated Requiem Mass. And he went on to tell how in the late fifties when fund-raising for St Patrick's College was slow and difficult an appeal for help went out to Fr Christy and his friends in America. The response was immediate, and magnificent. There were some present in the congregation who, he said, were the representatives of so many more and as such he thanked them sincerely. "You are all very welcome to this place" he added. "You helped so much to build it".

These buildings will in future remind Kiltegan missionaries of the pioneering work of Fr Christy Griffin, but those who knew him personally will need no monuments. His love of Ireland, his loyalty to the missions, his quiet charm and humour, his charity and deep faith – these are the memories which will be cherished by his family, by his many friends everywhere, by all of us whose lives he touched.

CHAPTER I (1787 - 1939)

1787

The first Scartaglin man that I found to achieve notoriety was Ulick Roche who was anti establishment.

Scartaglin White Boy Captured

On May 21st 1787 a report was sent to Dublin from Tralee about a search for a band of Kerry 'Right or White Boys'. On the previous Thursday, George Gun Junior had called out a party of the 12th Light Dragoons from Tralee Barracks and had set off for Scartaglin to apprehend Ulick Roche. Information's had been given before Thomas Stoughton that Roche had been among a band of 'Right or White Boys' that had assembled on October 12th of the previous year.

They had made the raid under cover of darkness on the lands of Dromultonmore and had burnt twenty-five cartloads of tithe hay and six cartloads of tithe oats. Roche was also accused of leading a White Boy band, which broke into a house in Dromultonmore on the 20th of October in search of a tithe lease, which the owner held.

The lease was not found and the White Boys destroyed some of the furniture in looking for it. A few moments before Mr Gun's arrival at Scartaglin, warning was given to Roche, and he escaped from the house where he was asleep in bed. He was perused across the adjacent fields and was eventually captured. The soldiers bought him to Tralee and he was lodged in the gaol at five o'clock on the following morning.

1798

In 1798 two men were executed one from Brehig, Cordal and the other from near Castleisland they were 'Buck O'Grady and John O'Daly after their execution their heads were hung on the Market House

1819

Coleen Bawn Murder

In the autumn of 1819 the people of County Limerick - and

indeed the whole country – were profoundly shocked by the discovery of the barbarous murder of a young peasant girl. The victim Ellen Hanley, a mere child, not quiet sixteen years of age, was of outstanding beauty. In addition, she was of a bright and friendly disposition, which endeared her to all that knew her, in her little world of Ballycahane and the nearby village of Croom in county Limerick.

Beautiful Ellen Hanley eloped with the handsome Limerick squire, John Scanlon, whose battered body was recovered from the Shannon some two months later. Scanlan a young sporting squire, whose gay smile had fluttered many a heart, was charged with the murder of Ellen Hanley in collusion with another not yet in custody, at Limerick spring assizes, in March 1820. Despite the fact that the celebrated Irish lawyer, Daniel O'Connell (The Liberator) Scanlan was convicted and publicly executed, on March 16th 1820, at Gallows Green in Singland, on the Clare side of the city. Months later, Stephen Sullivan Scanlan's servant and agent in the murder, was taken from Tralee Gaol, where he had been held on a charge of uttering forged banknotes at Scartaglin, and put on trial in Limerick city. He was convicted and publicly hanged also at Gallows Green, on July 27th 1820. He confessed from the gallows: "I declare before Almighty God that I am guilty of the murder! But it was Mr Scanlan, who put me up to it,'

Scartaglin 1837

Scartaglin, a Village in the Parish of Castleisland, Barony of Trughanacamy, Co of Kerry, Province of Munster, 4 and three quarter miles from Castleisland, contains 313 inhabitants. It is situated on the new line of road recently constructed by Government extending from Castle Island

through King William's Town to Roskean Bridge in The County of Cork. It crosses the Brown Flesk River near the Village over a neat stone bridge; and it is in contemplation to open a road connecting this line with one lately formed by Col. Drummond and C. Fairfield, E.S.Q. trough the adjoining parish of Ballincuslane, as far as the Village of Ardnagrath

Here is a R.C.Chapel belonging to the District of Castle Island, in which a School is held under the Patronage of the R.C. Clergyman

King William's Town; now known as Ballydesmond.

A Brief History of Scartaglin (1775 to 1930)

The place name Scartaglin (The Thicket of the Glen) in the Barony of Trughanacamy, in the heart of Sliabh Luachra (Rushy Mountain) is 600ft above sea level.

There was an old Church in Scartaglin, which was built around 1775 Fr. Darby Shanaghan was then the Parish Priest of Castleisland. It ceased operating as a Church in 1930 although the ruins remained until the mid 1960's. The height of the front gate was a constant challenge to young Athletes in the Parish at that time. (Check Folklore). It was situated where Riordan's Garage now stands. In the early 1840 it is said that Scartaglin Village consisted of well over 100 Thatched Houses after The Great Hunger of "Black '47" the number of houses in the Village was reduced by half as the terrible Famine had taken it's toll. Many people had died of hunger and disease and of those that survived many left to sail on "Coffin Ship's" as they came to be known, due to the fact that hundred's died on board such ship's before they reached the new world Scartaglin had branches of "The Land League" in the 1880,s and "The United Irish League" in the early 1900,s and a branch of "The Gaelic League" formed on the 20th of June 1909. There were many different occupations in Scartaglin, Blacksmiths, Coachbuilder's, Harness makers Stonemasons, Thatcher's, Cooper's Publican's Millar's Boot maker's.

1856

Scartaglin Fair

Killorglin: The May fair of Killorglin was held on Monday, at which a large quantity of stock, of a very good description was offered for sale, but few buyers attended, partly in consequence of another fair being held that day in *Scartaglin*. Prices, however, were good. A good milch cow found a ready purchaser at 10/. Dry cattle averaged something about six guineas a piece. Sheep brought a price about 1/. 5s., and store pigs were much looked for and enormously dear. - *Tralee Mercury*

1858

Coursing in Scartaglin at Haremount Nov 19th

Three matches came off on Monday last on the land of Ballahantourig near Scartaglin, the property of Mr John Twiss. The attendance was very good, considering the threatening state of the weather, three large cars having left the Hibernian at 9 o'clock that morning, beside a great number of persons who proceeded there on foot but no lady-as the correspondent of the Munster News alleges—graced the glen with her presence. She should indeed be a lover of sport to think of doing so, as the sharp bitter gale that blew at the time brought a tear to the eye of Andy Morrogh, the oldest sportsman at this side of the River Maine.

Great interest was excited by the first match, the dogs being the favourites of the town. The result of the dogs running was: M O'Donoghue's Spring beat Mr Kelleher's Bland. Two very nice courses were run between those dogs, which were not witnessed by the judges, but at third course, which was a severe one, Spring was declared winner, both judges alleging they had never seen a better matched brace of greyhounds.

The next match was between Mr O'Donoghue's White Colleen and Mr Kelliher's Skelper. This match was won easily by Colleen, which coursed her hare singled-handed through a deep furze glen and injured her hind leg seriously.

The third and last match was between Mr Kelleher's 'Blackbird' and Mr O'Donoghue 'Cautheen' 'Blackbird' led from the slips, but was soon collared by 'Cautheen' who gave him the go-bye at a convenient shoulder of the glen, so ended the course.

The greatest order prevailed throughout the day; not one person at the meeting but could look "Fr John" fair in the face. All, even those whom judgement was given against, agreeing in thanking Mr Twiss, who kindly gave his land for the amusement of the people, and his courtesy and fair judgement in coursing will not soon be forgotten; and also Messrs. H. D. Curtayne and McSweeney, who kindly assisted Mr Twiss in his decisions throughout the day. The game were abundant, and the ground in excellent condition. - *Killarney Correspondent*

Second Day's Meeting Dec 10th

On Tuesday another match came off on the lands of Haremount, near Scartaglin, between Mr. D. Kelleher's "Bland" and Mr O'Donoghue's "Skelper," for £30. Notwithstanding the privacy with which the affair was kept, the meeting was far more respectably attended than that of the previous one. Among those present I noticed Daniel J. Moynihan, Esq., J.P., Lieutenant Henry M. Cronin, Kerry Militia, Dr John Moriarty, Cloons Cottage; Dr Twiss, Captain Graham, Messrs. Morgan and Bryan McSweeney, Michael McDonogh, Esq., C.E. Killarney; J. Leonard

Esq., C.E., Thomas B.Courtayne, Esq., James Courtayne, Esq., and a great number of respectable persons from the town and neighbourhood of Killarney. Daniel J. Moynihan, Esq., acted as Judge, and Thomas B. Courtayne, Esq., volunteered, in a sportsmanlike manner, to act a slipper, the appointed slipper not having come to ground. Mr Eugene O'Regan directed the slipping of the dogs. The best two out of three courses were to be run. At one o'clock, p.m., the dogs were put into slips, when a first-rate running hare, and considered by Mr Twiss to be one of his best pets, was started. "Skelper," who is now seven years old, led from the slips, but was soon passed by "Bland," who won the course cleverly.

Second Tie. – Another hare was started on the same ground, when "Skelper," again led, which lead he maintained until they got into a glen, where the Judge had no further view, and "Skelper" was declared winner. About half-past three it commenced raining, when with the consent of all parties, the deciding course was adjourned until Monday the 20th instant. This was most unsatisfactory, as several other gentlemen brought greyhounds with a view of affording more amusement. However, a good days sport is anticipated on the 20th. - Killarney Correspondent

1860

Scartaglin Fair

The 18th was the pig fair, the best fair that has been seen in Kerry for the last 20 years. Lots of pigs fetched from 45 shillings to 50 shillings per cwt. Competition became so close between the buyers from several counties of Ireland that the Tralee gents ordered up their cars and drove out different roads, met several of the neighbouring farmers with heavy lots of pigs, bought them up quick, drove them into the fair themselves, and cleared to the tune of £1 per pig by the transaction. The Tralee buyers got up early that morning. Other commodities were sold as at the previous fairs. Nothing remarkable occurred during both days.

1861

Fr Michael Dunne (1846 - 1883)

Michael Dunne was born in Gortgloss, Scartaglin on 11th March 1846 in the middle of the 'Great Famine'.

Michael did his studies at Blackrock College 1866-9, followed by two years prefecting at Rockwell during which he followed the philosophy course with the Scottish students and the senior scholastics who returned from France because of the Franco- Prussian war. Michael was responsible for introducing the game of Caid to Blackrock College which was the fore runner to Rugby and Gaelic Football.

When the French Priests set up the College in 1860 they bought with them the ideals of Napoleon which were Aerobics and Gymnastics but the students soon grew tired of these pursuits and one day the student from Scartaglin stood up and said why don't we play football or Caid like we do in Scartaglin. The game of Caid was so rooted in Scartaglin it persisted for

years after Michael Cusack had introduced what has since been accepted as Gaelic Football. Michael Cusack came to teach at Blackrock 1874-76. Michael continued his studies in France, 1871-73, but because of ill-health he was stationed at Rockwell for two years. 1873-5 He was already suffering tuberculosis, Professed in Chevilly in1876 Fr Michael spent some time at Blackrock and was then appointed to Trinidad in the hopes that the climate there would be more beneficial. Ill-health forced him to return to Ireland. He spent some months at Blackrock and Rockwell before being sent this time to the College in Pittsburgh, P.a again the state of his health called for his return to Europe. He spent some time at Chevilly and Blackrock. Finally he went to Rockwell where he died 4th January 1883 aged 37 years. He is buried in Rockwell. B.G.

1883

Execution of Sylvester Poff and James Barrett

On Tuesday the 23rd January 1883 in Ballymullen Barracks Poff and Barrett were executed at Tralee jail. They had been found guilty of the murder of Thomas Browne, Dromulton, and Scartaglin, a former tenant farmer who had succeeded in buying out his farm holding and the leaseholds of two neighbouring farms as well.

The evidence on which the two were convicted was very shaky, in that there were no eyewitnesses, and identification

of the two men as having been near the murder scene was based on hearsay and "after the event" placement of Poff and Barrett at the scene. Local rumour had it that Browne was about to evict one or both of the tenants he had, and that it was they who had arranged his murder. However, this evidence was deemed to be too circumstantial to be worth further checking. Sylvester Poff (aged 36) was a first cousin of James Barrett (Poff's mother (Mary Barrett) was James Barrett's aunt.

Poff was married to Ann Sugrue, and the father of 5 young children (aged 7 years down to 6 months). Barrett (aged 26) was unmarried. Poff had been evicted from the family farm at Mount Nicholas in 1881; he had been arrested and served time under the Coercion Act. On his release, he joined the family at Dromulton.

"Kerry Sentinel" reported that about 70 men of the South Staffordshire Regiment (80th) cheered when the black flag was raised above the jail wall following the execution. The Press had been excluded from the execution, and it was the hope of the authorities that they would also be excluded from the subsequent inquest. However, Edward Harrington (editor, "Kerry Sentinel") and Henry Brassil (proprietor "Kerry Independent")



were both sworn in as jurors, and managed to report the proceedings. During the inquest, the Sheriff claimed that the two had confessed on their way to the scaffold. Mr Harrington pressed him further.

Harrington: Do you know the meaning of the word "confession"

Sheriff: Cal it a confession or whatever you like.

Harrington: A confession is an acknowledgement of guilt. Now that you know the meaning, will you persist in swearing they made a confession?

Sheriff (after some hesitation): They proclaimed their innocence.

Harrington: We have it at last.

According to the inscription on their monument at Dromulton they were innocent victims of British injustice and maintained their innocents' right up until their deaths.

1885

Castleisland Gaelic Sports Meeting

In the early days of the G.A.A. they were far more interested in individual sports events such as, running, jumping and throwing weights, than organised matches between teams. One year after the G.A.A. was founded a Gaelic Sports Meeting was held in Castleisland. A man named Con Kerin

won the half-mile (Handicap), his prize being a balance clock for his efforts. At this meeting also another man by the name of Thomas Prendiville also competed, these men were more than likely fro Scartaglin and Gortgloss respectively although the article does not state so.

1887

Moonlighters Refuse Money

The following appears in the 'Kerry Post' November 30th 1887, from its Castleisland correspondent:- Yesterday evening as a commercial traveller from a Cork tea firm was proceeding from Scartaglin to Castleisland he was met about a half a mile from Castleisland, by a party of Moonlighters, who demanded his revolver. The man immediately handed them the weapon which he carried for his own protection and offered them some money, but this they refused to accept.

1888

The Early Years

The exact origins of the G.A.A. in Scartaglin are lost in the Mists of Time, but records show that a primitive form of football Caid was played in the area in the late 1800's and most likely before the G.A.A. was founded in Thurles in 1884. Let us take 6 points from Fr. Ferris's letters 23rd January 1968 as quoted in the book 'The Story of Irish Rugby' by Edmund Van Esbeck.

- 1. The carrying game called Caid was played by all Branches of the Celtic Race, Caid was far more extensive and more ancient than hurling that was confined to the Gaels of Ireland and Scotland. There are two verities of Caid, Cross-Country Caid (Inter Parish) and (Field Caid) definite space and number of players.
- 2. In Britain during the Eighteenth Century the carrying game of Caid was dropped it was replaced by the Kicking game later to be called Soccer.
- 3. In Ireland up to 1885 there was not even a whisper against the carrying game of Caid.
- 4. Caid means the scrotum of the bull the bag containing its testicles.

5. The Clare man Cusack introduced the kicking game that he called Gaelic; it merely modified the Soccer Rules of 1867 slightly by allowing the use of the hands.

6. With the powerful new organisation at his back Cusack by the stroke of a pen killed Caid – it was not quiet dead, however, but it gave what was probably its last gasp in Castleisland three years later in 1888 in a match between the two out parishes of Cordal and Scartaglin.

In a recent conversation with a retired Detective Garda and ex Cordal footballer Moss Jones he related the following story to me. He said his grandfather told him about the game of Caid, that they put the ball at a mid point between the two parishes of Cordal and Scartaglin and the two home points (or goals) were the Churches in each parish. The object of the game was to get the ball to the home Church to be declared the winners, he said everybody in the parish had a role including old men armed with Blackthorn sticks who were strategically placed and they didn't hesitate to use their weapons when the need arose. Moss declared that it was a rough and tumble game and it resembled rugby more so than Gaelic he said that there were not many Physiotherapists present in those days or need for them.

1888

The following is a letter to the Editor of 'The Kerry Sentinel' Tralee dated 25th of October 1888 in which Scartaglin is mentioned in connection with 'The Gaelic Athletic Association' (G.A.A.) in Kerry.

Dear Sir-

A short time ago you gave publication to a letter of mine on the above subject, and I am glad to say that it bore a considerable share of fruit. Our County is however, backward in Gaelic Matters, and it is with the desire of further extending the Association in Kerry that I trouble you once more. There are at present the requisite number of clubs, namely, fifteen affiliated to entitle the formation of a County Board, and with that end in view I am, with authority of our local Committee here, issuing ,circulars to different clubs to send two delegates to the County Convention arranged to be held at the rooms of 'The Young Ireland Society', Tralee, on Wednesday, the 7th of November. There is no reason; however, why we should rest satisfied with the bare number necessary to establish a governing body, especially when I think there are many Parishes which only merely want to have the way pointed out to them to put themselves into line. I would like very much, and it would be a great advantage, to have the different Districts represented in the County Board; But as there are many into which the Association has not up to the present permitted there shall be no remedy but to draw the members of which the Board is to consist for the ensuing twelve months, from the comparatively few clubs available. Such a Board then, while technically being representative

of the whole County will virtually be only the elect of a small proportion of it; and the disadvantages at which it will have to meet in the matter of further organising the County, will be such as would not otherwise exist.

At the forthcoming County Convention delegates will also be appointed to represent the County at the Annual Congress at Thurles, and Kerry ought to be able to send at least three or four. When Ireland's National pastimes had died out or were dragging out a lingering existence in other counties, the manly games of hurling and football were being actively cultivated in many parts of Kerry. Should it be said then that when there is a general revival all over Ireland, Kerry is the only county which gives a faint and half-hearted answer to the call. I do not think this will be any longer so I would say to the young men of Kerry; join the ranks of The Gaelic Athletic Association, whose object is to revive our Tailtean Games, do it because it is your duty; do it out of pride; do it for any motive; Because it is an association which deserves well of the people, and because it is at present a great force and is bound to become much greater one in the Athletic, social and political life of this country, there are Dingle, Castlegregory, Annascaul, Keel, Milltown, Firies, Currans, Scartaglin, Brosna, Knocknagoshel, Ballybunion, Ardfert and other places in which there ought to be no difficulty in forming clubs if only one or two men in each place put the task before them.

I shall be happy to give any assistance in my power to persons taking this matter up. Copies of The Rules may be had from me on application. I hope that action will be taken immediately as there is not a single day to lose.

Scartaglin Races (26 December)

A race meeting was held at Scartaglin on St. Stephen's Day. The principal event was the Scartaglin Plate of five sovs, in which the first three were Mr. Rd. Shanahan's Daisy Bell, Mr Timothy Kerin's Mountain Hare and Mr James O'Mahony's Maid of Barna. The other competitors included Mr John Kearney's Copper Alley, Mr Barry Scollard's Ventry Harbour and James Riordan's Irish Molly. The event lay with the winner of the first two out of three races, and as a result was not obtained whilst daylight prevailed; the contest was postponed to a future date.

Variety was lent to the proceedings by a cycle race on the road to Kingwilliams town, which was won after a close finish by Mr Shanahan, from seven competitors.

Those Races were held on the 9th inst, and were most amusing. There was a large concourse of people present. Ten horses were entered for the first race, five of which were started first, and five secondly, and the final contest lay between Mr Nelligan's Maid of Vale and Mr Kerin's Mountain Hare, and after a well contested race, was won by Maid of Vale.

2nd Race: Six horses went in close pursuit, and Mr O'Leary's Rover carried off the prize.

3rd Race: Four started for a bridle, which was won by Mr. O'Connor's Flytrap by a head

4th Race: For a wager between the owners of Irish Molly and Johnny Tinker the most entertaining ever witnessed. Irish Molly led for the first round, when Johnny Tinker closed up and opened the way, but not yielding to the spurs fell at kicking, and Irish Molly won easily.

The Scartaglin Young Irelanders

First Record of a Game

The first game we have a record of is a challenge game between Scartaglin Young Irelanders and Castleisland Geraldine's. It appeared on the front page of "The Kerryman" dated 29th Dec. under G.A.A. football match in Scartaglin. It opened as follows;

Report

An interesting football match between teams representing Castleisland and Scartaglin came off on Sunday at Scartaglin. The issue was a spirited and well contested one, and a large crowd of spectator's were present. Both teams met on a previous occasion and both possess a high prestige for footballing. Castleisland won the toss and played with a slight breeze in their favour. At the throw up of the ball Scartaglin (Young Irelanders) rushed into their opponent's territory, where a scrummage took place, succeeded by some hot play and lively exchanges. Castleisland (Geraldines) retaliated and invaded their adversaries ground with a dash but failed to score. Undaunted, they again attacked and were rewarded by scoring a minor. From the kick out Scartaglin got possession of the oval and transferred to the left wing. Here some exciting play was witnessed, which resulted in Scartaglin annexed a goal. Play now assumed a warm and determined character. Castleisland trying to retaliate, but nothing by way of scoring, from this until the blow of the whistle was accomplished at half time. The score stood;

Scartaglin (Young Irelanders) 1-0Castleisland (Geraldines) 0-1

Second Half

On resuming the Castleisland men evinced a most determined spirit to get even with their opponents and alter some fast play succeeded in securing a minor. The kick out was a very good one but Castleisland very effectively intercepted and after a brisk tussle registered a minor. At full time the play stood;

Meeting on 22nd January

Mr Marcus Kearney was moved to the chair amidst applause. He explained in a very practical manner the objects of the meeting. He said their duty was to appoint a treasurer and secretary, and also to appoint collectors for every townlands in the parish. He expected the collectors to exert themselves so as to have the necessary funds on hands to enable them to hold the races on Saturday, February 11th weather permitting.

Mr Marcus Kearney and Mr. M.D. Murphy were appointed treasurer and secretary, respectively. The following gentlemen were appointed to collect the different townlands – Scartaglin, Messrs. Humphrey O'Leary and M.D. Murphy; Gortgloss, Florence McCarthy and Edmond Prendiville; Dromulton, J.O'Connor and P. Fitzgerald; Mullen, Michael Murphy and T. Horan; Adriville, J. Galvin and Pat Spillane; Direen, W. Casey and J. C. Horan; Leha, John Boyle; Knockeenahone, Cornelius Mahony, R.D.C.; Knockreagh, M. O'Brien; Comeennatagil, J. P. Riordan and Pat Nolan; Knockrour, M. O'Connor and John Reidy; Counguilla, John Collins and P. Buckley, Kilsarcon, M. Daly and Cornelius Loughlin.

The Chairman said, as there was no other business to be done at present he would now adjourn the meeting. The meeting then adjourned with a hearty vote of thanks to the Chairman. – Next meeting: Sunday 29th inst.

Hugh Daly

Records show that Hugh Daly was the first Captain of the Scartaglin team to be named on paper. He was the son of a boot maker Jerry who lived in the Village of Scartaglin. Hugh was also an accomplished cyclist and was an active member of the Castleisland Sports committee. He also tried his hand at acting and played many a leading role in local Drama's that were held under the flagship of 'The Gaelic League'. When Castleisland G.A.A. were playing many big games Hugh was the man they called for and he did not let them down.

In 1913 Hugh along with his father (Jerry) and mother (Maggie) immigrated to Philadelphia Hugh was 23 years old at that time. Hugh did have a brother Jerry who was a priest in Philadelphia and they stayed with him after they immigrated for a while. I could not locate a photo of Hugh or found out what really happened to him but I am sure he could have been proud of the legacy he left behind for Scartaglin folk.

National Directory Resolution Adopted

Castleisland Monday

On Sunday a representative meeting under the auspices of the United Irish League was held at Scartaglin Co Kerry. Mr M Kearney was moved to the chair. A resolution was proposed by the Chairman, seconded by Mr C. O'Mahony, R.D.C., and unanimously adopted, thanking their Parliamentary representative, Mr John Murphy, M.P. for the very attentive and able manner in which he was advocating their claims in Parliament. The Secretary read the resolutions of the National Directory, which were adopted. The Chairman said nothing was ever gained without keeping up a vigorous and strong agitation (cheers). They should never relax their struggle for self-government, and they should be united and determined.

Scartaglin v. Cordal

The above teams met on Sunday at Scartaglin. Much interest was taken in the game, as both teams have a high reputation in the football arena. Scartaglin won the toss, and elected to play with a slight wind in their favour. From the throwin Scartaglin got possession, and in less than five minutes

drew first blood, a minor per J. Lyons. The kick-out was a good one, and Cordal-getting possession of the ball rushed it to the home goal, where, after a stubborn defence, they annexed a point per T. Prendiville. From this to half-time play was of a very even character, the score at half-time being 1 point each.

On resuming Cordal got the better of the throw-in, and, before the players had settled down, scored a point per T.O'Sullivan. The kick-out was a bad one, and Cordal again pressed, but J. Daly, who was playing a sound game for his side, with a splendid kick cleared his line, and T. Daly getting possession scored a point.

The exodus this year from those districts has been enormous and its effects are being very materially felt, especially by the farmers, who are in several instances, are unable to get the necessary Labour to prosecute their husbandry.

In 1909, Castleisland and Scartaglin met in two football matches. The first match was held in Castleisland and the home team won by 0-6 to 0-1. The second match was played in Scartaglin a fortnight later where the town team won again but this time by the narrowest of margins

Match in Castleisland

The crowd that assembled in the favourite rendezvous the 'Mill Field' on such a short notice on Sunday last showed by their presence that interest in and sympathy with matters Gaelic are not dead in Castleisland. As the result of reported challenges from the Castleisland, Scartaglin strenuously worked to muster a team able to take the field, Sundays contest was the result.

Mr Denis Breen the veteran of more than one hard fought All- Ireland contest assumed gladly a labour of love and the whistle. Castleisland won the toss and played against a strong breeze.

They were away with a burst at the throw-in, but Andy Leary was just there in time for Scartaglin and after a sharp scrimmage an over resulted. The kick out was well received, and Scartaglin made a determined onslaught on their opponent's territory. Again and again Leary Kissane and Tom Prendiville sent them attacking, but "Doctor Broder" frustrated all their attempts to score. Castleisland now began to play a fast combined game, but some missdirected shots by Cahill lost them more than one score. Mike Breen sent some telling long shots from mid-field; Tom O Fitz and K O'Mahoney missed alternately; but after ten minutes fast play Fitz got possession far out and a well directed high shot gave the Scartaglin custodian no chance of saving, and Castleisland had first blood a minor. This put the lads from the country on their mettle; they were all over their opponents, they had everything but a score, again and again Leary, Kissane and "Champion" Brosnan were called on to defend and only when Desmond, Cahill and Mahoney

had each in turn failed to score did Castleisland notch the second point per Tom Connor. Immediately before halftime the same player was responsible for another similar score.

The second half opened with the odds distinctly in favour of Castleisland and they increased their lead. Breen brought the ball from the 50yds line in a dribble to the mouth of the goal and with only the custodian to beat, had to be content with a minor. From the kick out Scartaglin took the skin to the Castleisland goalmouth Broder saved; Loughlin came to the assault again, but was fouled. Scartaglin now got their first score off a free a minor. They fell away again soon after; Fitzgerald and D.Reidy scored a point each for Castleisland. When Denny Breen blew the whistle Castleisland had won easily by 6 points to 1 point. However with a little more practice, and more attention to the scoring line, Scartaglin should be able to give a better account of themselves in the near future.

The Return Match 27th March

On Sunday last in Scartaglin, on a field kindly given for the occasion by Mr John Tangney, and in the presence of a large crowd, the return contest between Scartaglin and Castleisland was witnessed. These teams met a few weeks ago in Castleisland, and then Castleisland won comfortably by 6 points to 1. In last Sundays contest they emerged victorious again, but, as I anticipated by a narrower margin. Mr Denis Breen threw in the ball, with Castleisland facing a slight breeze. Castleisland burst away, but were checked by Kissane, from who a long kick sent his side looking for the Castleisland posts. Tom Connor relieved, and sent the ball along the wing. Here O'Mahoney received and centred well but the Scartaglin custodian saved. From a scrimmage in rattled the leather again. This time Andy Leary warded off the danger It looked however, as if Castleisland could not be denied the score and after ten minutes play a minor was landed to their credit per Mahony. From the kick out M O'Sullivan got possession and sent his right wing forward to the attack H. Daly, however r was not equal to the occasion At midfield, J.O'Connor and and his shot was wide. O'Sullivan were in conspicuous. They kept their forwards well supplied, and eventually H. Daly scored the equaliser. With good combined play, Castleisland sent to the other end of the field. Tom Connor, Desmond and James Breen were making desperate attempts to put their side on the lead, but Kissane, A. Leary and Brosnan were equal to the demands made on them. Kissane sent along the right wing, where from far out a long shot landed between the Castleisland uprights, but the whistle had sounded for a foul. Tangney took the free and scored a minor. Fast and furious now raged the play, now it was the Scartaglin custodian clearing now "Doctor" Broder baffling all attempts against the lead being increased. Broder and Breen continued to outclass the Scartaglin forwards, and Kissane was more than once responsible for turning some desperate onslaughts on his side. James Breen got possession, wriggled through a bunch of opponents and with a long well directed ground kick added another minor. The half time saw the score Scartaglin 4 points; Castleisland 2points; Early in the second half James Breen and D. Reidy scored a point each, and the register stood even Leary and Kissane cleared in splendid style; M.O'Sullivan responded from mid-field, but his forwards were again outclassed by Breen and Broder. Castleisland were again attacking per T. Connor were repulsed by Dennehy- who here made a fatal error. He left his place between the uprights to follow out the ball. The leather was sent in by Desmond; and fisted through for the major score by Reidy. A couple of frees sent Scartaglin attacking they were well centred but T.O'Sullivan and Tom Prendiville failed in turn to convert. Daly received again from midfield and this time made no mistake. The score was now even, but it was only the wonderful defensive work of Brosnan, Kissane and Andy Leary that kept it so. After repeated attacks they succumbed, and with only a few minutes to go Mahoney sent in a shot that left his side winners by one point.

Juvenile Match

The first mention of Juvenile football in Scartaglin also seems to have occurred in 1909 the following appeared in the Farranfore Notes, a game which we won by two points to nil

On Sunday last, 14th inst., when the veterans of Kerry football were successfully competing in the City of the violated treaty for all Ireland honours, it was gratifying to lovers of the ancient game to witness the contests at Farranfore between some local teams. Judging by the enthusiasm that prevailed and the determination of the contesting teams to wrench victory from each other, it is safe to predict a long future for Gaelic games in the County of their birth. But this was only to be expected when such past exponents of the game as Dr. J. M. Murphy, G. Fleming, R.D.C. John Murphy, N.T. etc, etc., were interested deeply in the proceedings. Farranfore now boasts of two teams juvenile and adult and both were requisitioned to defend their own territory on Sunday last against invading teams from Scartaglin and Currans respectively.

At 2.30 sharp Mr Murphy took the youths in hands, and under the captaincy of Master James Cotter, the home team appeared to be doing exceptionally well for a time, but in the final the superior strength and weight of their opponents enabled them to score a victory by 2 points to nil. The decision of the match between the senior teams was now arousing keen anxiety, and no small trouble was experienced in arranging the preliminaries. However, at 3-30, Mr Reardon in possession of the whistle, the struggle was begun, and to the very end it never flagged in interest to players or spectators. The value of the matching will be understood when after 70 minutes of ceaseless the referee declared "no score". To specialise individual players would

probably appear invidious but I mistake not in stating some of Kerry's future defenders in All Ireland struggles were seen stripped on Sunday last.

Player Profile

Jerry Tangney (right) played with Castleisland in 1909. Jerry was born in Mount, Scartaglin. He qualified as a National School teacher and took up residence in Castleisland around that time. I have a photo, which was given to me by his grandson Gerald Borget, I also received a copy from Helen O'Connor of Castleisland, who reliably informed that her



grandfather and Granduncle were also on this Castleisland team, This photo is often mistaken as a Kerry team of 1909 because of the inscription on the ball and because many of the team members actually played for Kerry. Helen informed me that her grandfather and granduncle are both in the picture and she said that they both played for Kerry, she also named Dinny Breen as a member of Kerry's first All-Ireland win in 1903. he photo shows Jerry in the back row (middle, dark shirt) he attended St Patrick's Teacher training College, Dromcondra, Dublin and played for Erin's Hope in the Dublin Co Championships.

Erin's Hope was the club attached to the Training College this information was given to me by Paddy Brosnan School Master of Castleisland boys National School who knew Jerry well, he also attended St Patrick's Training College and went on to play for the Kerry Juniors. to Jerry his daughter Gertie (R.I.P.) took great pride in telling us that her father was in the photo she was also a great supporter of Scartaglin teams and indeed all sports her sister Joan (R.I.P.) in fact played Camogie with Scartaglin in 1935. When I received the photos I did some research and came up with the following report from 'The Kerryman' dated 12th of June 1909 and Jerry featured very prominently in the forward line Castleisland and Rathmore and scored a point that bought the teams level and the report went something like this; A. Leary M. Breen and M. Walsh were each responsible for sending their side attacking and after 15 minutes play amid great excitement J. Tangney got possession of the ball and made the teams level. Castleisland won this game five points to three. Jerry got married in 1911and moved to Scartaglin he got a post at Knockeenahone National School where he went on to become Headmaster.

A strange coincidence was that Jerry bought his house in Scartaglin Village from Hugh Daly's (Scartaglin football team captain) father when they immigrated to Philadelphia in 1913. Hugh and Jerry played together on a Castleisland team in 1912 against Abbeyfeale, Jerry played many times for Scartaglin after this it also seems that Hugh's sporting organisational skills were missed.

In Scartaglin

A correspondent writes anent the absence of affiliated clubs from the rural districts. "Is it want of material-bone, sinew and muscle?

Is it utter indifference to the fate of our national games?" he asks. He considers that a little initiative and a little energy would go far to remove the real cause, which is the difficulty experienced by country teams in securing grounds and paying the expenses inseparable from the starting of any club. There are, however, a few football teams in the district, and there was a close contest last Sunday between teams from Scartaglin and Farranfore. It is a pity that such teams meet with so little encouragement. Surely it would not be difficult for a group of earnest and energetic young fellows to establish a flourishing football or hurling club in Farranfore or Scartaglin. I hope to hear more of these young teams in the future.

Grand Concert in Scartaglin

A few months ago and in the face of many difficulties, a branch of the Gaelic League was formed in Scartaglin, and under the care and guidance of that capable, painstaking popular district teacher, Mr Casey the Crabh and classes in connections with it are progressing satisfactorily. Contrary to what might be expected, the financial aid received was confined to subscriptions from the members themselves.

A few indeed outside the ranks contributed liberally, but they were too few to save the situation, provide the sinews of war, and keep the banner of the Gaelic League floating triumphantly in the district, the committee decided to organise a grand concert, and it is gratifying to have to add that success beyond their most sanguine hopes crowned their efforts.

The schoolroom, Scartaglin was kindly put at their disposal for the occasion by the Right Rev. Monsignor O'Leary and Mr. Cahill, and spacious as that room is, it was filled to almost inconvenience.

Championship. The players on both sides were a splendid lot of young fellows finely developed and muscular, showing plenty of style and pace, and capable of great endurance. It is a great pity the local men do not play matches abroad; as with experience so gained they would be capable of developing into first class players

The play

Play began in very showery weather and the field was in a very soft condition, which was not in favour of the Rangers, who though not victorious played a splendid game. They had also lost six of their best players owing to illness and other causes. Their team a weak one played a spirited game and took their defeat, as they should in a sportsmanlike manner.

Edward Ned Murphy

We could not write the history of Scartaglin G.A.A. without referring to Ned Murphy. He was a schoolmaster of Scartaglin National School. Ned was from Kilsarcon, Currow and we are not sure if he played for Scartaglin He did make a contribution in later years he was the Scartaglin Delegate along with Guard Mulvihill to the East Kerry

Divisional League in 1926. He was also appointed to take charge of the U/16s competition held in the Castleisland Ned played for the Kerry Junior team in 1913 and won an All-Ireland medal; he played at centre field and was partnered by fellow Currow clubreaman Humphrey Murphy in the final. Ned was only one of five men selected for the first round that remained right up until the final. He played seven championship games in all.

Some of the 1913 All- Ireland Junior Championship was in actual fact played in 1914, and Ned is mentioned as having played well against Limerick in a replay on the 3rd of May 1914. Ned was also called to play for the Kerry Seniors in 1914 and played a challenge game against Wexford. Wexford had been the defeated finalists of the Senior Football Championship's of 1913 at the hands of Kerry. Wexford outclassed Kerry in this challenge on a score line of 3-5 to 0-2 this game was played on 5th of July 1914. That wexford team went onto win 4 All-Irelands in a row from 1915 to 1918.

This game probably caused a setback to Ned's football career in the Kerry jersey however he did get selected many times after this but without All-Ireland success, he was also involved in some capacity when Kerry won the Al-Ireland in 1924 as he appears in the Photograph which was taken during the semi-final. Ned also lost his All-Ireland Junior medal at one time, and a man ploughing a field on Kerin's farm found it almost 40 years later Ned's son Michael Peter played with Scartaglin on a number of occasions and he was also an accomplised Rugby Player at U.C.C.

Described as one of the greatest stalwarts of the G.A.A., and one of Old "Croke Park's" personalities. Paddy a native of Scartaglin, Co Kerry was a Civil Servant in the Land Commission, from 1908 to 1958 when he retired as Higher Executive Officer.

A footballer in the first flight of his youth, Paddy represented the Civil Service F.C. of which he was a founder member , on the Dublin Co Board for a number of years and there was no more respected representative.

He was known to be a great judge of a potential footballer. In later years he devoted most of his spare time to the acquisition and improvement of the fine grounds for the Civil Service club at Islandbridge a grand memorial to a selfless Gael. He spent 20 years as Chairman of the Civil Service club, and remained as Treasurer until his death in 1958.

As a player full hearted too on the field in his time an intrepid midfielder of the high catching school of his native Kerry, whether with his Civil Service club (Clann Lir) with the fifteen that brought the Junior All-Ireland to Dublin in 1914 or later with the Dublin Seniors who once

he captained. Eloquent and humorous he shunned publicity. At his funeral in Deans Grange Cemetery a huge gathering of top G.A.A. officers, players, colleagues and a host of friends paid their last respects to a great Gael.

Few people in Scartaglin nowadays would have been aware of Paddy's exploits apart from his family and friends which he left behind

in 1906. He took up residence in Sandymount, Dublin and lived all his adult life there until his death in 1958. His widow, son Sean and daughters, Nell, Patricia and Marian survived him.

Marian who still lives in the family home (which incidentally is situated at the back of Lansdowne Road Stadium) and I am indebted to her for information and photographs. She also told me that his medals were stolen in a house break in. We cannot be sure if Paddy played with the Scartaglin Young Irelanders or not but we presume he did. Paddy is one of Scartaglin's most famous sons.

Important Historical Date

The Scartaglin Volunteers were formed on the 7th June 1914

The situation in Ireland between the years of 1913 to 1923 was probably the most volatile in our history and most

young men in Scartaglin as indeed the rest of the country were tied up with military activities. Gaelic football and other sporting pursuits had to take a back seat for a while, apart from the odd occasion when they defied the British authorities in a show of strength.

Some route marches were planned and evenings of each week fixed for drill practice, which henceforth is chiefly to consist of rifle drill and skirmishing.

At a meeting of the Kerry County Board on Saturday (Mr P.J.O'Connell presiding) a letter was read from the Central Council regarding the right of police to enter sports fields without paying their way. The Chairman said no exception would be made as far as the Kerry County Board was concerned. All should pay.

Failing To Register (A Castleisland Case)

At Castleisland Petty Sessions Court. The King at the prosecution of District Inspector J.A. McDonnell against John P. Kearney, Scartaglin for that – Defendant being an Alien to wit. An American citizen had failed to furnish to the Registration Officer of the Registration District in which he resides, particulars of the matters set out in the 3rd schedule of the Alien Registration Consolidation Order, 1914. Mr McDonnell – This man who is an American citizen was warned by the Sergeant to register on several occasions. I may say that he came to the barrack on the 14th February and

asked for me, I happened to be out at the time and he went away without saying what he wanted. I told the Sergeant to tell him to come to the Head- Constable but he never came. Sergeant McDonagh gave evidence of having asked the defendant on several occasions to go to the barrack to register and he said there was no hurry. He was two years home from America. Defendant said he came to the barrack and asked for the D. I. but he was not there. It was not easy for him to come to town as his father was ill and he had to watch him. Mr McDonnell said he did not wish to press the case but he would say that the defendant met the case very badly by not registering although being warned by the Sergeant so many times. The object in bringing on the case was to warn the people. He asked the bench to put on a nominal fine, Defendant was fined 2s 6d (Two shillings and six pence).

1918

Ballantouragh

There used to be a Royal Residence at Beal-atha- an-Teamrach in the days when Ireland was a nation. There will be Football matches between Kilcummin, Currow, Gneeveguilla, and Scartaglin etc, there on Sunday 23rd June at three o' clock in which will be seen good samples of the men that will make Ireland a Nation once again. A great gathering is certain to be seen at the field where the matches are to be played.

Gaelic Sunday (4th August, 1918)

In July 1918, the British Authorities banned public meetings and assemblies, and efforts were made to prevent the public playing of games except with an official permit. The G.A.A. response was to arrange that they would have hundreds of matches all over the country, all beginning at 3pm on Sunday 4th of August. Of course they would not seek a permit. Generally speaking the project was a great success, but in Kerry the programme was adversely affected by bad weather and was less than successful. I have no report of what happened in Scartaglin that day; this is more likely to have happened in July because there seems to have been no interference on the part of the authorities anywhere in

Kerry on Gaelic Sunday. But three weeks prior to this date in a report from the "Killarney Echo" dated Saturday 20th July the following appeared.

Scartaglin Aerideacht Proclaimed Military and Police Present.

Castleisland, Sunday evening.

A large force of Military and Police arrived here from Tralee this morning and with local Police proceeded to Scartaglin to prevent the holding of an Aerideacht. The intended Aerideacht created a great stir in the locality as it had been rumoured that the Police warned the organisers that if they insisted on carrying on the entertainment they would prevent it. The committee issued special posters on yesterday announcing their decision to carry out the programme as arranged.

This morning, however, Rev. Fr. Fitzgerald during Mass at Scartaglin appealed to the committee to abandon the idea of holding an Aerideacht, pointing out the uselessness of creating trouble. The committee then held a meeting and decided to cancel the arrangement. The people left the Village quietly when the decision was made known, the Military and the Police remaining in the Village until a late hour in the evening.

Aerideacht: An open-air gathering where people perform singing, music, dancing, reciting poetry. Playing games and other sporting pursuits.

Football Tournament at Castleisland (15th Aug)

Military Present

A football Tournament was organised by the local Sinn Fein Club in Castleisland on the 15th August.

Teams representing Castleisland, Cordal, Currow and Dysart taking part. There was a very large attendance. Just as play opened a large force of military and armed police arrived on the grounds and remained until the people dispersed. No attempt was made to stop the matches.

Player Profile

Paddy 1890-Gorman 1982 Paddy Gorman was born in 'Knockanore Hill' overlooking the River Shannon and Asdee and Ballylongford in North Kerry in 1890. At the age of 14 he was to travel with his aunt to the U.S.A., but the night before he met his pals and they were going to Limerick to find work with some farmers. In the middle

of the night he left a note on the table telling his mom and dad that he was going to Limerick to find some work and not to the U.S.A. He worked in different parts of Limerick for a few years. In the mean time he made many the return journey home to 'Knockanore' to see his family. When he was returning to Limerick after one of his visits he met a friend who was travelling to the Castleisland area and Paddy decided to travel with him. When they arrived in Castleisland they had a few drinks. Paddy got talking to a few people and they told him that there were a few farmers looking for workers in Scartaglin. Paddy said he would try his luck so he took 'Shanks Mare' and hit for the road to Scartaglin. Arriving at 'Madame Nolan's' Bar at 10 o'clock

on a Tuesday night. She had great welcome for him, giving him plenty to eat and drink and a place to sleep. Paddy was a great character so as the days and nights passed the people of Scartaglin and surrounding areas got to know Paddy and he got plenty of work. Around 1920 he met Margaret Reidy from lower Gortgloss they fell in love, married and had 7 children. When war broke out Paddy joined the Volunteers and spent many nights cutting roads and had to try and work the following day. Paddy used to travel and play with the Scartaglin football team, he used often talk about the teams they used to play, Ballydesmond, Knocknagree, Kiskeam and many more. They used to walk to all the games and when they came back on the Sunday evenings they used to dance polkas at "Adriville Bridge". A lot of Handball and pitch and toss used to be played in Scartaglin on the long summer evenings. In later years, Paddy went to live with his daughter Maureen Gorman Brosnan in Currow. His grandson Johnny is the present Coiste Na NÓg Ciarraighe Chairman. Paddy's Great-Grand children have worn the Kerry jersey with distinction. Peggy and Maura winning All-Ireland U/14 Championship and Blitz Medals with Kerry.

Maura was capped on 6 occasions for the Irish Basketball team. Peggy played with the Scartaglin ladies football team winning a Kerry Junior medal 3 years ago. John won a Munster league with the Kerry Minors, while Liam won an All- Ireland minor and U/21medals and played with Kerry winning a Munster Senior Championship medal with Kerry in 1998. Liam was also capped for the Irish Basketball teams on many occasions. Paddy's youngest great-grandson Conor is another name to look out for in the future. Paddy was an adopted Scartaglin man and in later years always spoke about the great love he had for the people of Scartaglin and always followed the fortunes of the Scartaglin football teams, and local Scartaglin news in the "Kerryman" Paddy passed away in 1982 at the age of 92 and is buried in St Michael's Cemetery, Killeentierna, Currow

1920

This is a photo of the R.I.C. (Royal Irish Constabulary) Police Barracks in Scartaglin Village in 1920. The photo was taken shortly after an attack on it by the I.R.A., in which it was blown up and set fire to on the 6th of April. At that time the R.I.C. were an armed police force, and were the principal source of information for the British Government who were considered enemies of the Republic.

These R.I.C. barracks were posted in almost every Village in the country. The attack is documented in many books such as 'The men of the South' and 'Tans Troubles and Terror'. Most of the men in this in this photo played Gaelic Football for Scartaglin around that time it is unfortunate that I do not have all the names as most of the people who could identify them are gone to their Eternal Reward 'God Rest Their Souls'.

1923

Troubled Times - 'The Scartaglin Tragedies'
There were three Shootings in Scartaglin in December two

of the shootings were fatal. Sergeant James Woods was shot on the 3rd of December he was a member of the Garda Siochana from Co Clare.

Tommy Brosnan was shot on the 6th of December he was a publican's only son who resided in the village he was only 19 years of age, there is a marble plaque erected where he was shot a few yards from the

Village on the Castleisland road. Con Horan (Mount) and William (Bill) O'Connor (Adriville) were shot at on the 11th of December while trying to escape from a gunman at Dromulton William escaped injury, and Con receiving a bullet to the lower back which was not fatal, he was later pinned with a medal by President Eamonn De Valera in Dublin.

Another man was shot at Mount Falvey Scartaglin in March of the same year by the name of Seamus Walsh he was not from Scartaglin. Jeremiah O'Leary (above) Commandant 7th Battalion Kerry No1 Brigade from Mount, Scartaglin was shot dead on the 23rd of May in Hartnetts Hotel in Castleisland, there is a monument dedicated to him in the Village of Scartaglin.

1926

Dan Collins Remembers

For much of the history of the G.A.A. in the area in the earlier years we have to rely on the memories of people such as Dan Collins. In an interview he related some of his recollections and information that older men passed on to him. "The first thing I remember" said Dan, is football being played above in Donal Murphy's "Quarry Field" at Gortacappul (which is now the residents of Jim Murphy). Scartaglin and Currow played that day and I could almost name the teams. There were three members of the Garda Siochana, Mulvihill, O'Malley and Tom Boylan, then you had Paddy Nolan, Bill Browne was the Goalkeeper, Donal Kearney, Pa Cronin, Tom Prendiville (Gortgloss) Jack Coakley, Denny Bradley, Connie Bradley, PaddyO'Sullivan (Gortacappul), Paddy Tady Brosnan, Paddy Healey was playing as well but he was not sure if he was playing with Currow or Scart, also Maurice Pats Brosnan, Jerry Teahan (Kilsarcon), but he thought they all played for Scart but he could not be certain. The Currow team were Mick Culloty, Mick Cunniffe, Neily Horan, Mossie Mitchell, and Humphrey Murphy to name but a few. He did not remember who won the game but the year was 1926.

School League's

That same year there was a school league started in the district of Castleisland, the teams that competed were as follows, Cordal, Scartaglin, Currow, Curranes and Castleisland. Scartaglin played Cordal in the opening game that Scart won. Scart then went on to play Castleisland in Scartaglin and there was only one score in this game which was a point scored for Scart by Jerry Lyons.

This game was played in Mount just where Jack O'Connor's house is now situated, the field was a very small one and the posts had a low crossbar, Jack Buckley was the Scart goalkeeper and he was of a low stocky stature which all contributed to Scart's victory.

Scart then went on to play Curranes in Currow but were defeated in this one. Curranes had a very strong pick at that time, because evidently there was a brilliant teacher there at the time by the name of Maurice Brosnan and people came from all over the District to attend Curranes School to obtain a good education.

The future Munster an Irish International Rugby player Joe O'Connor from Castleisland played against Scart that day, as did Tim Kenny who later resided and played for Scartaglin.

They also had Mickey (Thade) O'Herlihy the McCarthy's from Cordal Denis and Mick brother's of Martin who played for Kerry. They also had Baunie Buckley from Pound Road who Dan claimed was shaving at the time and went to school for a week in order to enable him to play for Curranes.

A meeting of teachers interested in the above was held in Scott's Hotel Killarney on Saturday 8th inst. Rev. Bro La Salle was appointed Chairman and Maurice Donovan Hon. Sec.

The other teachers present were Messrs. Humphrey Murphy, C.J.Fleming, J. Houlihan, J.O'Reilly (Killorglin) and J. Moynihan (Rathmore).

The following rules were adopted to govern the competitions.

- 1. Boys of 16 years or under on July 1st 1926 are eligible.
- All competitors shall be genuine school going children.
- 3. Two schools or three in the same parish can amalgamate to form teams.
- 4. If there are only two schools in a parish amalgamation can take place with the nearest school in adjoining parish
- To work the League on economic lines the following areas were decided on
- 6. Killarney Area: comprising Killarney, Kilcummin, Fossa and Firies.
- Killorglin Area: Milltown, Beaufort, Castlemaine and Killorglin.
- Castleisland Area: Castleisland, Cordal, Scartaglin and Killeentierna.
- 9. Rathmore Area: Rathmore, Gneeveguilla, Glenflesk and Knocknagree.

East Kerry Divisional League (Senior Football)

A meeting of the above was held in the Central Club, Killarney on Sunday, 23rd inst., Mr Dick Fitzgerald presiding. In the late 1920s there was no All-Ireland Colleges Competition, but there was an Interprovincial Competition in which Munster, Ulster, Connacht and Leinster competed. Denis was chosen from St Brendan's College to play with Munster and they went on to defeat Ulster in the Final played in Croke Park in early April. Denis played many times with Scartaglin he was also an accomplished Golfer in later life.

Pa O'Connor

In 1928 Scartaglin played a match in 'Murphy Field' Gortacappul and the opposition were our near neighbours Currow, unfortunately we do not have a result, but according to eye witness Paddy J.O' Sullivan (Adriville) was present at the game gave the following account.

He said that Pa O'Connor (who was also from

Adriville) played a storming game for Scartaglin that day, and that he was playing on a Currow player Tadgh T.P. Brosnan who at that time was a Kerry Junior player. Pa was also an accomplished hand ball player. Pa's career was short in a Scartaglin shirt because in later years he was forced to seek employment outside the parish.

Death of Kerry Priest (4th Aug)

Rev. Amadeus Cronin born 2nd July 1885 Educated in Scartaglin.

1930

In the 1930's when Scartaglin was trying to form a football team they also had a Fife and Drum Band that travelled together to football matches. The band usually paraded the teams before the matches and entertained the spectators at half time. One of the band leaders was a man named Michael Murphy from the village who was Paddy Murphy's father a player on the Scartaglin team at that time and later to become Chairman of the G.A.A. club. Getting back to Michael (pictured below first adult standing from left) he died tragically in a quarry accident in 1940 but he died a hero, because he held up some rocks which were about to fall and in the process saved the lives of 10 men who managed to escape while he held up the rocks with a shovel, and he told the other men to run. Unfortunately he lost his life when the quarry caved in on top of him; Michael was also a member of the Scartaglin Flesk Rangers team of 1911, and a member of the local drama group in the early part of the century.

G.A.A. Senior Team

Scartaglin tried to form a senior team to play in the newly formed Castleisland District league in 1931 though they had a very base to pick from mainly the Village and Counguilla according to Dan Collins in fact they had to go to Kilcummin for three players to fill the team. They were Andrew McCarthy, Den Leary and Eugie Moynihan. The other members were as follows Denny Collins, Jackie Collins, Dan Collins, Denny McSweeney, Jim Lyons, Pa and Bill O'Connor of Adriville when available. Jack Lyons played when he was around or they were short, he said that Jack had a marvellous leap and fetch. Jack's brother Jerry he referred to him as our 'Boss' he was always our headman or Captain another member was Jerry Teahan (Kilsarcon). This team lined out in a game in Castleisland.

G.A.A Fund Raising in the 1930's

When Scart tried to form a team in 1931 they went about trying to raise funds to buy a ball. Times were tough and money was scarce not only in Scartaglin but also worldwide. They had a Church gate collection, as they could not afford to advertise in 'The Kerryman' as this would have cost too much. They also tried to achieve this by holding a 'Rag Meeting' (greyhounds running in pairs after a mechanical hare) another of Scartaglin's favourite pastimes.

There was one brace and one man felt he did not get a fair crack of the whip so he asked the organising committee for another go and the committee being quick off the mark said if he wanted another go he would have to pay the entry fee again to which he agreed. By the time the committee had given Bill O'Connor (Adriville) the price of a pint for running the 'Rag' (mechanical hare) they still did not have enough for the ball but they did eventually scrape together the price of a ball. - By Dan Collins (Counguilla)

1931

Formation of Castleisland District League

In March the Castleisland District League was formed, the following teams joined up; Farranfore, Ballymacelligott, Cordal, Scartaglin and Currow. Other notable events of this year were the death of the commanding father figure of Kerry football Dick Fitzgerald, the whole county lamented his death, and the East Kerry Board was in disarray.

Castleisland League

The second round of the above league was played in the Castleisland Gaelic Grounds on Sunday 17th inst. The competing teams being Castleisland v Scartaglin, and

Currow v Knocknagoshel. The attendance was good.

These were two good matches, in which a good deal of promise could be seen. The Scartaglin boys are novices at the game, but they gave a creditable display against their more experienced opponents whose combination proved too much for the hardy sons of Scart, although the latter scored a goal early in the game.

The final score was – Castleisland 2–5 Scartaglin 1-0

Scart second outing was was played in Currow against Farranfore on July 5th again Scartaglin were on the losing side scores were not given. Currow also played Knocknagoshel on the same day and Currow came away with the spoils.

Kerry County Board Meeting (28th April)

An application from the Currow club to run a District League between Scartaglin, Cordal, Currow, Knockeen and Currans was referred to the East Kerry League.

This is a profile of an outstanding player from Scartaglin Jerry Lyons in the 1930's described by Dan Collins his great friend and what they had to endure in the pursuit of their favourite pastime. Dan Collins (Right) of Counguilla was also a player brilliant who's career lasted from 1930-1951 tells the story about his great friend Jerry

Lyons (Left) who was from the Village of Scartaglin, They played together on many an occasion.

Dan referred to Jerry as our 'Boss' or captain he was always our headman and general organiser. Jerry was the outstanding player of his generation in Scart and made the Castleisland District team in 1935. Castleisland played Boherbee (Tralee Mitchell's) in Castleisland and Jerry had an outstanding game playing on Paddy Whitty and John Joe Sheehy who was present that day and remarked that if Lyons was playing his football in Tralee he would be on the County team. Before that time also Con Geaney played with Boherbee when he was on the Kerry team, he later moved

to Castleisland and played with them towards the end of his career. Jerry never got selected and became disillusioned with the game and in 1937 turned to the game of Rugby a game that he also excelled at winning the Munster Junior Cup with Castleisland Rugby Club in 1940. It is also said that Jerry would have propped for Ireland if he had taken up the Rugby at a younger

age. Jerry did play Gaelic after this with Scart in challenge games and tournaments. Jerry was a huge loss to the G.A.A. in Scartaglin in the 30's when he turned to the Rugby.

Jerry also played for Duhallow in the Cork Junior Championship illegally along with another Scart man Ned Buckley and Con Geaney from Castleisland.

They played under assumed names. Duhallow won the Junior Championship in 1936. Most of the Duhallow team were from Dromtariffe in fact two of their players later went on to win All-Ireland medals with the Cork senior team in 1945 they were Dick Harnedy and Dick Kiley. Dromtariffe disputed the medals but they said they did not want a bloodless victory so they put up the medals and they challenged the Scartaglin team.

Jerry Lyons went about putting a strong Scartaglin team together in fact some of the players were from the Castleisland District they were as follows Jimmy (Junior) Tangney, Tom Lacey (Castleisland), Garry Barry (Farranfore), Maurice Butler (Currow), Tim Kenny and Jerry Lyons played at midfield they had a tactic worked out before the game as Kenny was the taller of the two he broke the ball and Lyons picked up all the breaks and it worked well on the day for them.

They also had on the team Willie Drumm (Cordal), Eugie Moriarty who worked serving his time in Dromulton he was from Kilcummin and you had Paddy Murphy, Tim Kerins (Scartaglin) the latter who's son went on to play for the Cork seniors as a goalkeeper and won two senior All-Ireland medals in the late Eighty's and early Nineties.

This game was played in Clonbanin and the same day there was also a Sports Meeting held. The Scart boys picked up Timmy Brosnan (Glountane, Cordal) at Cullinanes Cross on their way, as he was the famous weight thrower in our locality and indeed in Kerry and took him to the Sports Meeting. Timmy specialised in the half hundred (56lbs shot). Another athlete that competed that day was Dr. Pat O'Callaghan Irish and Olympic Champion hammer thrower who won two gold medals in the 1928 and 1932.

1933

A Lead From Scartaglin 150 Competitors take Part in Parish Sports . An Athletic Revival in Three Months The Cynics Answered

Five miles to the south- east of Castleisland and fringing the Cork border, among beautiful rolling hills nestles the parish of Scartaglin. The hills are now bare, save for the trim hedges of furze and whitethorn, though legend tells us that not many generations back one could if one cared to travel from North Cork to Slieve Mish without touching the ground, so thickly wooded was the district Rich in history and romance it is unknown on the outside except to the sportsman and commercial traveller save in times of national trouble when its natural defences have been utilized by friend and foe down through the ages. Like a walled in city here the hunted Priest with a price on his head found shelter, here Drury camped with his army on his way to suppress Fitzmaurice and his Spanish Allies. And in this district legend has it in Bally- na - thourig assembled the Irish chieftains at one of their last national gatherings and in later times, here among these friendly hills was shelter and hospitality for the young men who took part in the national struggle.

The hardy industrious natives may be seen in the fields in the Summer time from dark to dark but when the long nights come around one has only to go to one of the many "gathering" houses where old men now bordering on 90, surrounded by younger men, tell of the great Athletes of their time. They tell of the exploits of "Daly The Runner" who beat the blood-hounds from Mount Eagle to Kilsarcon, of "The Mountain Hare" a cow herd, whose fleetness of foot attracted the eyes of English promoters under whom he made records in England, or they modestly debate among themselves as to which one of them led in the ten-mile race to Castleisland or who failed to jump so- and —so's big black mare back and forth with the saddle on. What more natural setting to look for a revival of Gaelic games and pastimes.

Here on Sunday Sept. 3rd we were treated to one of the most enjoyable days in our life. At a one day's Sports meeting in a remote Country village, half- confined half- open to be treated to the spectacle of 150 competitors in weight throwing, running, jumping and cycling is truly a sight thrilling and unforgettable. One may wonder is this parish of athletes or what kind of organisation brought it about. Three months ago Scartaglin was backward in athletics that it was difficult to get a single man to run whilst weight-throwing and jumping had become a lost art- too laborious for this dance- loving age. A couple of young fellows more visionary than the average set to work to pull the parish out of its lack of interest in athletics and organised into four athletic groups under a committee and trainer. Each group was asked to train three of its best men for each event in

cycling, running, jumping and weight- throwing and got three months to train. With hard work on the part of the organisers and Gods assistance in giving them a glorious sunny day, the results surpassed the expectations of even the most hopeful of the organisers When on Sunday last they held their first Sports meeting and made a record gate of £25. The open events brought only few competitors from the neighbouring parishes but the five-mile Marathon from Castleisland, though only attracting four competitors, aroused an interest in athletics that hasn't been paralleled for years.

It is the confined events that attracted our attention mostly and it is about these that we have most to say. The groups turned out seemingly at full strength for every event there were twelve competitors and though the standard was not high the competition was keen and the results, after only three months training, were praiseworthy, the winner of the hop step and jump doing 42feet; the high jump 5feet; the 16lbs shot 33feet; the half cwt 22feet; whilst the cycling and foot races were done in time comparing favourably with our leading sports meeting.

It was a great day for Scartaglin and its Sports organisers and let us hope for the County It is an answer to the cynics who would insist to the lack of interest in Gaelic games. The...Ven.Archdeacon Casey, P.P.Castleisland, now in his 85year and only just recovered from a severe illness was loud in his praise and showed by his presence his appreciation of what was being done for Gaelic culture. Scartaglin has given the lead in the right direction.

We look forward to seeing their Athletes in outside fields, and to hear more of the doings of their energetic committee who slogan is to endeavour to make an athlete of every man of athletic age until they have every towns land as of old with its athletic champion.

Let us hope other parishes will follow suit and arouse the latest interest of our young people in Gaelic Pastimes. Then we may feel certain that our county, with such a great Gaelic past, will again give the lead in National athletics

It was hard and fast and a trying race, for the afternoon was calm and sultry, and most of the four Irish miles was up-hill, the gradients often steep and long. Connor won it, Burke being a good second, and the others well in evidence. The four are magnificent sprinters and splendid types of the athletic power in the district.

As I have said the full-backs must move faster than against Antrim and Buckley has only to play the whistle and the ball to be invaluable. The boy from Scartaglin will go far but he must remember it may be good tactics for an opponent to "get" him, and the best and only way to beat such tactics is to keep his eye on the ball forget the man and keep going until the whistle sounds.

Kerry Minors

Ned Buckley from Counguilla played for the Kerry Minors in 1933 and won an All-Ireland medal in the process.

Ned's talent was first spotted while playing for Tralee C. B. S in the Munster Schools and Colleges Final when they defeated Mallow 2-2 to 0-5 and he played a prominent part. Ned was an outstanding centre halfback and was the first man from Scartaglin to play for a successful Kerry minor team and probably the first to play for any Kerry Team. Ned did not have much of a chance to play for Scartaglin as he was married and resided in Tralee where he did play for John Mitchels for many years. I myself wondered why Ned never progressed from a centre halfback on a great Kerry Minor team. I posed this question to him in an interview and he explained that he had to move to Dublin to learn the Pharmacy Business and Football had to take second place for a while. He did play a couple of trial games for Kerry before he went to Dublin and marked Jimmy (Gawksie) Gorman another Kerry Legend.

Scartaglin G.A.A. Club invited Ned to their Annual Social in the Millennium year 2000 along with all the other old time footballers from Scartaglin that were still living. They were honoured by the club for their services and were presented with plaques. As Ned was the oldest, Compare Weeshie Fogarty

invited him to say a few words. In his speech Ned declared he was the only living member of the Kerry Minor Team of 1933 alive today and he asked the people present to join him in a prayer for their souls. Ned Buckley has now become a legend in Scartaglin football circles and torchbearer for all players from Scartaglin lucky enough to follow in his footsteps and pull on the Kerry jersey.

1935

Camogie Team

Scartaglin boasted a Camogie team in 1935 some of the members of that team were Joan O'Leary (nee Tangney) Kitty Lyons, Mary Bridget Buckley and Mary Dennehy (Breahig). They played a good few games according to Dan Collins and one day in particular in Tangney's Field and the opposition was Currow and evidently they had an outstanding player on the day by the name of Kathy O'Loughlin from Anna. This was one of their last games and they broke up shortly afterwards.

The Scart senior team versus Knocknagree followed this game. Tim O'Donnell who was a member of the Garda Siochana in Knocknagree arranged this game. Tim was a native of Camp, Castlegregory and prior to this he played for Kerry and was a member of the four in a row team of 1929-32. Being a Guard in Knocknagree they built a team around him. There was also a good organiser by the name of Christy Morley and another good player by the name of Pat Meade. Scart won this game mostly by marking Tim O'Donnell out of the game.

Scart played Knocknagree on at least two more occasions around this time according to Dan Collins.

The next time they played in Browne's Field (Scartaglin) on this day they had the help of two Castleisland players to make up the team and one from Cordal Jimmy (Junior) Tangney and his brother Roman and Willie Drumm. Dan Collins and Roman Tangney scored two goals for Scart. Dan scored the first while he was on the attack he was knocked to the ground but still managed to get a leg to it and just got it in by the post to the corner of the net. The second again involved Collins on his way through Roman Tangney shouted "tip it to me" "tip it to me" and Collins dually obliged and Tangney finished it to the net with a powerful drive. Dan Collins claimed that Roman Tangney was a great man to score a goal and his brother "Junior" excelled at scoring points. In this game Jerry Lyons and Willie Drumm cancelled out Tim O'Donnell by one marking the man and the other playing the ball.



The above teams met in a friendly encounter at the Sportsfield, Millstreet on Sunday last. The proceeds were for the benefit of the local parish church, and a large crowd were expected.

Unfortunately, the morning turned out very boisterous and wet and many people left the town not expecting the teams to turn up, in this they were wrong, for the Kerry boys arrived at Millstreet about one o'clock and fortunately the rain ceased. Both teams lined up at 3 o'clock and considering the state of the weather there was a fair crowd in attendance.

The Corkmen pressed from the start, and after some lively play were rewarded by a point. Play continued at midfield for some time, and it could be seen that owing to the wet, slippery condition of the field ball play of a high standard was not to be expected. After about 15 minutes' play Kerry levelled up the score with a point. A strong mist was now falling and the players were frequently coming to grief. The Corkmen had the best of matters from this until the half time whistle and put up four points in succession.

Though the visitors made many determined efforts to score the defence was too sound, and the half time whistle came with the scores:

The change over the Kerry boys pulled themselves together and after some hard play secured a point. Cork, however, rapidly transferred and secured a sixth point. On the kick out Kerry once more attacked. Lyons (Kerry) was now playing a great game, and after some exciting play they secured a third point. Play continued lively with Lyons prominent. Cronin in goal, saved well for Kerry.A quick transfer brought the ball to the Cork side where amidst great enthusiasm Kerry scored a goal, thus drawing level. With both sides even, interest in the game became intense, but it could be seen that their exertions and the heavy condition of the field was having an effect on the players falls being very frequent, and it seemed as if no player could hold the ball, though many made the mistake of trying to do so. now secured a point, and thus had the lead again. however did not hold it long, as Kerry once more levelled up. With only a few minutes to go Cork, from a free scored a point, and it looked as if they would be winners, but the Kerry boys, after a hard struggle secured the equaliser, and the full time whistle came with the scores:



Evidently a Scart team played Killmoyley on two occasions; they first met in Killmoyley and later in Scartaglin. According to David Daly (Goalkeeper on that team), Rev. Fr Christy Griffin was a good friend of Sean Lovett of Killmoyley as they both attended

In 1948 Scartaglin were playing with Cordal, In 1949 Scartaglin were playing with Currow. The Currow Junior team defeated Wolfe Tones they were a Castleisland team mostly from Killarney Road. There were 8 Scartaglin members' playing with Currow in that Final, David Daly was in goals then you had Paddy Murphy, Patsy Kerin, John Joe

Kerin, Pa Daly, Denis Lenihan, Dinny Collins and myself (Sonny Leane).

Also in 1949 Cordal started a parish league between Cordal and Scartaglin 11@ side three teams from Cordal and one from Scartaglin. Scartaglin were too good for any of the Cordal teams the games were played in Donal Kearney's Quarry Field. Cordal then metaphorically speaking shifted the goalposts and came up with the proposition that they would get four more medals and make the game 15 @ side between Scartaglin and Cordal the match was played in Lucid's Field in Cordal and we won the game the score I cannot recall. The four extra medals were never bought and Scartaglin got 11 medals and left four players without a medal. There was no club or funds at that time so the medals were held by Paddy Murphy and eventually the powers that be in Scartaglin at that time decided to hold a Parish League 11@ side.

They divided the parish into four teams Counguilla, Tournonagh, The Rovers (East side of the Village) and Rangers (West side of the Village). To give you a picture of the location and boundaries of the four teams, Counguilla area started at the creamery the road up to David Daly's (no house there at that time) turn left and all the Scartaglin parish down the main road to Castleisland, back Dromulton over Gortgloss road which included Tim (Tiger) (Lyons who was only about 16 years old at the time) we will come back up to Scartaglin Cross and up the Village including Lyons and Tangney's up the 'The Shankill Road' all the houses on the left which were nonexistent except Leane's ,Con Tangney's and Mick Leary's all were Rangers Homeland. All on the right which included Jerome (Dave Ned) Bill's, Riordans away down the Village Tom Fleming's over the lane Murphy's, Fr Christy's, Christy O'Sullivan's over to Kearney's (Johnny) up Gortacoppal, Mullen, Adriville, Direen, Knockeenahone, Barna, all the Scartaglin Parish in that direction.

Before going any further with the infamous Parish League, which was played in the latter part of 1950 as far as I can

recall the Final was in September or October of that year. Scartaglin had a very good team in 1950 and 1951 they had a lot of young players and a good mix of experience as well. They played very well in the Castleisland District League and were defeated in the semi-final by a strong Currow team with just one point in it. Currow had on their team 8 members of the panel that won the County Senior Championship for Castleisland in 1950 they were as follows Paddy Dennehy, Tom Shanahan, P. B. Shanahan, Jimmy McCarthy, Dave Butler, J. J. Sheehan, Martin Culloty and Bertie Shanahan who was a sub.

To return to the infamous Parish League both sides of the Village Rovers v Rangers played the Final and the tempo was very high even before the Final the trouble started, Rangers defeated Counguilla it was a great game of football. Counguilla had some very good footballers at that time Dan Collins, Dinny Collins, Dinny Sweeney, Pa Daly, Denis Lenihan, John O'Connell (Fr), Mick O'Connell, Paddy Buckley and Tim Kenny playing at full forward.

There were rows after the match and later at the Creamery in the mornings and some nasty situations developed then at the Final all hell broke loose. Jack O'Connell was the Referee in the Final.

So finished the makings of a great Scartaglin team that would probably have won the Castleisland Senior District League. just look at the team, Patsy, Michael Anthony, Moss, John Joe Kerin, Tim (Tiger) Lyons, Johnny Kearney, Paddy Murphy, Dan Collins, Christy Griffin (Fr), Paddy Riordan, Diarmuid O'Connor (Fr), Jerome O'Connor, John O'Connell (Fr) add in Pa Daly, Dinny Sweeney, to be joined shortly by Pa Joe O'Connor, Philip O'Sullivan, Timmy O'Sullivan and others.

1952

In 1952 there was no club in Scartaglin and local players threw their lot in with Currow. I was working

in Ballybunion and played with St Patrick's (now Beale) but I came home a couple of weekends and played for Currow. It was my first and last time playing two games one after another both games against Ballymac, juniors at centerfield and seniors at left half back both games in the Castleisland District League.

1953

In 1953 Scartaglin were with Currow again. I can't remember much of what happened in that year as I went to England that summer and stayed until Christmas, I played with St Marys in the London Co. Championship.

1954

In 1954 Scartaglin turned to Desmonds and stayed there until 1956 some of us played in the Senior Co. Championship.

1957

In 1957 Cordal and Scartaglin joined forces and went on

to win the Castleisland District League on record it will say Cordal but Scartaglin supplied 8 players, they were Bill Kenny, Denis Riordan, Tim (Tiger) Lyons, Timmy O'Sullivan, Patsy Kerin, Pa Joe O'Connor, Sonny Leane and sub John Joe Kerin.

From there on Scartaglin played with Cordal and many good players emerged during that time Mick O'Connor, Brendan Flynn, Jerry and Tom Coffey, Patsy O'Connor, Tadhg O'Connor, Philip O'Sullivan, Patsy O'Sullivan all came on stream during those years also during that period Scartaglin players Denis and Jerh Riordan played with Desmonds. I was Chairman of the club for a couple of years; I was also their Delegate to the District Board (and Vice Chairman of the District Board) and a member of the 3-man selection Committee of the Castleisland District Championship team in the County Championship.

Coming to 1964 Scart were playing with Cordal. Scart were not affiliated as a club on that year. They played in Carnival Tournaments and were trying to affiliate as a club in late 1964. You had a rule at that time that you could not affiliate a new club at the expense of another club. It was Fr Christy Griffin, who was in America at the time that got the job done all the way across the Atlantic.

In 1964, I was working in West Cork (Castletownbere) and only came home at weekends.

I had planned to get to England that year and Mick (O'Connor) was doing the same. I cannot remember being asked if I would play in any one of those Carnival matches at that time. It was probably taken for granted that I would not.

At Christmas 1964, Tim (Tiger) Lyons called to me and I told him I was going to England, his thoughts that having two teams would only destroy both clubs, because both would be too weak, if the Lyons, Brendan Flynn and the Coffey's played with Scart then they would have a great team

In the early 1960s when I was Chairman of the Cordal club, I made contact with Fr Christy Griffin regarding a Cup for local competition between both Parishes. I was against a Parish League after what happened in Scart, but we agreed on mixed teams no areas or Town lands. It worked well and Mick O'Connor was the first winning captain.

The second year, it was nearly all a Scart team that won it the only one out was Tadgh O'Connor (R.I.P.), who was with the beaten finalists. I should have said that Fr Christy sent home a lovely Cup. It was for the benefit of both sides Scart and Cordal. That Cup must be somewhere in Cordal still and it would be nice to see it used in memory of Fr Christy, who was a devoted G.A.A. man.

Between the years of 1965 and 66 three Scartaglin men played for 'Sons of Erin' Northampton they were the brothers Mick and Pa Joe O'Connor and Sonny Leane at that time they had to seek employment in England.

Sonny continues with the story;

We came home in December 1966 and Cordal moved very quickly as we were invited to their Social and made a presentation at the Social. I made my position very clear that I was hanging up the boots. A lot of pressure was put on Mick and me, John Roche, The Lyons and Brendan Flynn. I kept to my retirement pledge anyhow and I was elected Chairman at their Annual Convention, even though I was not present that night. I was forced to play a few games in the Junior Championship and was a delegate to the County Board and County Convention. What was surprising was the fact that anyone from Scart never approached either Mick or myself on our return home that year.

Looking back on all that I have written on this, and looking at the present set-up in Scart and every other club through the county and indeed through the country, it shows what the G.A.A has done for the community past time and sport for the youth of each parish. Back in those dark days of the 40's and 50's we had no field in Scart, no football to play with just a small sponge ball or a made ball with clothes. We played on the Village Green and later in Kerin's Field where the cow barn is now.

We used to travel to Brian Mac's and Lenihan's Lacka in Counguilla, Paddy Free's in Mullin and the old School Yard. It is vital that every Village and hamlet should have its own field and their own club whether it is 'A' 'B' or 'C' teams makes no difference it's the community spirit and catering for our youth, the winning of the East Kerry Novice Championship for Scartaglin this year (2002) is as important for the players and club officials as Strand Road (Kerins O'Rahillys) winning the Co Final.

As you can see Jim our past in sport in Scart had its good times and very good footballer's emerged none better than your own brother Patsy, we came from England to the Minor and Senior All-Ireland's in 1965 and Patsy was a sub in the Kerry team he played with the Kerry Minors in 1966, also with the Kerry U/21s and the Kerry Juniors, I think that Junior team won the All-Ireland, what year I cannot say, later Patsy was on his way to London for the 'Whit Sunday Tournament' with the Kerry Senior team then it was Crokes Club Championship. The best game I saw Patsy playing and he played many was for the Kerry U21s in Tralee against Kildare in the All-Ireland semi-final, to make the Kerry Minors in 1965-66 and not a student in St Brendan's or C.B.S. speaks for itself.

To get back to 1949 eight of the Currow Junior team were from Scart also Dan Collins, Dinny Sweeney and Moss Kerin were playing with the Currow Senior team. In 1941 Scartaglin were playing with Cordal and they won the District League again Paddy Murphy, Jerry Lyons, Dan Collins and Dinny Cronin (Paddy Riordans uncle) was the goalie.

Cordal won it again in 1970 (it was played in March 1971) again you had Scart players Brendan Flynn, Mick and Tadhg O'Connor, Jerry Coffey, the Lyons Mossie, Patsy, James, I am not sure if Tom Coffey was playing or not Diarmuid Flynn (Big 'D') was the captain I would like to know where that Cup is now, is it lying idle somewhere in Cordal.

In 1956 there wasn't a District League played in Castleisland District the Board had no funds, so in 1957 Fr Bob Walsh then P.P. in Knocknagoshel bought a Cup and Denis Guiney (formerly of Brosna) the owner of Cleary's of Dublin put

up lovely set of miniature cups 18 in all so the 3 subs got trophies.

Medals were scarce in those times as money was in short supply. I would not be comfortable going back before my time of around the late 40's, Dan Collins and Jerry Lyons won Munster Junior Cup medals with Castleisland Rugby team, Michael Peter Murphy who was Ned Murphy's son was a nice footballer and Rugby player he was going to U.C.D. and I believe he gave very little time around Scart. Dermot Hannafin stayed in Scart (at Lyons Bar) when he went to Glountane N. S. teaching, I believe it was his first job, he played with Cordal for a year before going on to play for Castleisland

1957

Philip O'Sullivan of Mullin was a player on the 1957 Castleisland District Minor Team that won the County Championship. The following year he played with Desmonds in the Intermediate Championship Final that they also won.

In May 1958 he was also a member of the Pallaskenry

Agricultural College that played in 'The Kerryman Cup' trophy (Perpetual) Sponsored by Mr. Moran, (Ogie Moran's father). They were beaten in the Final by the Limerick Garda team comprising of players from all counties in Ireland, one man that played with that Garda team was Moss Jones of Cordal who was a Detective in Limerick at that time.

The Score is not known is not known but Limerick Garda won by a narrow margin. In September 1960 Philip was based in Enniscorty, Co Wexford. He played for St Aiden's Club and they reached the County Senior football Final, and again Faythe Harriers of Wexford beat them. One notable player of distinction was 'Napper McGrath' who played with the victorious Wexford hurling team of the same year,

also the legendary Nick O'Donnell, Paudge Keogh and Tom Ryan who were also members of that great wexford hurling team of 1960 that won the All-Ireland.

Tom Moriarty played at full-forward for Faythe Harriers he was also a Kerryman who in 1954 won an All-Ireland medal with Meath at full-forward. His parents had come to live in Co Meath as migrant farmers in the early fifties. Philip continued to play for a few years after this with St Aiden's and now resides in Co Wexford and he carries the Scartaglin banner well in the Leinster Province

Pa Joe O'Connor of Mount was another brilliant Gaelic footballer of the late fifties who won a County Minor Championship medal with Castleisland District. In the Final he played at full-forward scoring a whopping 2 goals and 2 points out of a winning score of 4goals and 2 points for his team. The same year he was a member of the Cordal team that won the Castleisland District League.

The following year he was also on the Castleisland Desmonds team that won the County Intermediate Championship Title. Pa Joe like many other of his generation was forced to immigrate to England to seek employment some time later. He settled down in Northampton where he joined the local G.A.A. Club 'Sons of Erin' where he went on to have a glittering career. Pa Joe resides in Northampton nowadays where he owns and runs a successful business in the building trade. In the middle eighties his son Sean played at centre-field for Huddersfield in the All-Ireland Club Championships. Pa Joe is another of the lost generation of Gaelic footballers from Scartaglin

1957

Cordal Knocknagoshel at Castleisland 12th October

A very large Crowd saw one of the best league finals ever played in Castleisland, when Cordal defeated Knocknagoshel, 2-2 to 1-4 in the final of the Castleisland senior football league last Sunday.

For the greater part of the hour Knock' looked like carrying the Fr. Walsh Cup home to Knocknagoshel as they appeared the better balanced team, but in the all important last four minutes it was Cordal lasted the better.

But for the great display of Tim Lyons, at full back and Ed Griffin, at centre half, who never played a better game, the cup would have gone to Knocknagoshel.

Knocknagoshel were the first to score when Larry O'Connor, after a solo, sent in a grand goal. Shortly after from an attack

by Cordal, led by Patsy Kerin, Sonny Leane had a point. Just on half time Cordal had a free and from a tussle in the square, Pa Joe O'Connor goaled. The teams were level 1-1 each at the interval. Knocknagoshel forwards were again the most dangerous in the second half and had three points per McHugh (1) and two by J. Griffin, without reply from Cordal. At this stage Larry O'Connor went off injured and was a big loss to Knocknagoshel, as up to this he was the most dangerous forward on view. With only eight minutes left for play Knocknagoshel were three points ahead and a great attack by Cordal resulted in a penalty.

Prendiville took the penalty and the Knocknagoshel goalie saved, but fouled the ball in the square, which resulted in another penalty for Cordal. Excitement reached fever pitch and a stoppage of play resulted when the crowd swarmed around the goal. When order was restored Cordal called on their captain Tim Lyons to take the shot. The county star made no mistake: to leave the scores level with five minutes to go. Then both teams fought hard for the all-important point, which came to Cordal from half forward Kearney. After that Knocknagoshel did their utmost to get the equaliser but the Cordal backs stood up well.

Best for the winners were: Tim Lyons, Ed Griffin, John Brosnan, Patie Prendiville, Patsy Kerin and Pa Joe O'Connor. For the losers were: McElligott, O'Connor, Kirby and Walsh. Mr. Danny Flynn (Currow) was an impartial referee

Tim Lyons or 'Tiger' as he become known was actually born in Gortgloss Scartaglin in the family home contrary to what some people believe, but the farm he grew up on spans the border between Cordal and Scartaglin.

Tim at the tender age of 16 played in the Scartaglin Parish League of 1950, which is also documented in this history.

He also played in the Castleisland District League Semi-Final of 1951, this information courtesy of Sonny Leane who played on the same Scartaglin team. If the break- up in the Scartaglin team of 1951 had not occurred who knows what would have happened.

However most people in Scartaglin will lay claim to him as he was well respected by all who knew him, but they do not deny that he played practically all his football including his Kerry career with our neighbours Cordal and won numerous awards while doing so.

Tim's Outstanding Record

He was a member of the St Brendan's Killarney team who lost the Munster Colleges Final in 1953 to Tralee C.B.S. and the same year he played with the Munster Colleges

side that failed to Connacht in Limerick. He won a Minor Co Championship medal with Castleisland in 1952 and played Kerry Minor the following year. Subsequently, he played senior championship football with Castleisland and blossomed into one of the great Kerry backs of the late '50s.

He came on as a substitute in the All-Ireland semi-final against Dublin in 1959 and was at left full-back on the team that beat Galway in the final that year.

He won his second All-Ireland senior medal with the Kingdom in 1962 when Kerry trounced Roscommon in the Final. Tim was also one of the stars of the semi-final victory over Dublin that year.

He also figured prominently with the Kerry teams that failed to the great Down teams in the 1960 Final and again in the 1961 semi-final. He won National League honours with Kerry in 1959 and 1961.

He played Sigerson Cup football with U.C.D.and was a member of the Combined Universities teams that played Ireland in representative games in 1956, '57 and '58 and was on the Kerry All-Ireland selection that beat the Combined Universities in 1963.

Tim was full-back on the Munster teams that lost the Railway Cup finals in 1958 to Connacht and in 1959 and 1961 to Leinster.

The Vice- President of the Cordal Club Mr Paddy Brosnan N.T, Cordal, welcomed guests, and thanked all concerned who made the social a success. "We

have with us to-night" said Mr Brosnsn "the Sam Maguire Cup. This is its first time in Scartaglin and I think it rightly deserves to be present at the Cordal Football Club's social because no man did more to bring it back to Kerry than Tim Lyons," In reply, Tim Lyons said that he was delighted to be present. He thanked them for their great reception given him, and said he was honoured to be a member of the Cordal team. Other members present were; Mr John Roche (President); Mr Sonny Leane (Chairman); Mr Jerh O'Connor (Treasurer); Mr Frank Kenny (Vice -Chairman); Mr Patrick Lyons (Secretary). Denis Riordan

Denis Riordan was one of the top players of his generation in Gaelic Football in the Castleisland area in the mid to late 1950s. Unfortunately for him the Scartaglin G.a.a.

Club did not have a team when he came on stream, however this did not stop Denis becoming a great player. He was a central player equally adaptable at centre- back or full-forward. Denis tasted his first success when the Cordal team won the Castleisland District league in 1957when they defeated Knocknagoshel in a close fought Final. In the District League Final

the following year Denis played a prominent part when he scored a goal late in the game and forced a strong Desmonds team to a replay. Desmonds won the replay and denied Denis his second medal. Later Denis went on to play for the Desmonds and played in the County Championships between the tears of 1960 and 1963, his brother Jerh also played with Desmonds. In 1964 Denis lined out with the newly formed Scartaglin team, and played a big part in the formation of

the new Club. He played for Scartaglin until 1972 winning many Carnival Tournaments. Denis played his last game for Scartaglin in the East Kerry Junior Championship Final of 1972 which Scartaglin defeated Dr. Crokes 'B' in the Final.

Official Formation of Scartaglin G.A.A. Club

The present day club was officially formed in 1964, in fact, the ground work for the formation was done in above all places, "Gaelic Park" New York at a meeting between the late Fr Christy Griffin and Dr Jim Brosnan The present day club was officially formed in 1964, in fact, the ground work for the formation was Dr Brosnan, the then Chairman of the Kerry County Board. This meeting was later reported in "The Kerryman" and Dr Brosnan was quoted as saying "what an extraordinary place to make this request". The club was then formed in July 1964 and they were invited to take part in a tournament in Knocknagoshel in conjunction with the Harvest Festival on the 15th of August six teams took part and Scart played a strong Currow team in the final and Scart won on a score line of 1-6 to 0-10 and received a beautiful Cup and a set of medals were presented to the team. They then formed a local league that was run very successfully in August and went on until September four teams took part and they then formed a senior team proper. In 1965 Scartaglin applied to the Castleisland District Board for inclusion in their league and Championship fixtures for that year however there was an objection from the Cordal club but their motion was defeated. The Chairman of the Castleisland District Board Mick Beehan had no hesitation what so ever in granting club status to Scart after seeing their success in the Knocknagoshel tournament in 1964. They entered the Castleisland District League and the first match was against Cordal on the 7th March 1965 it was a great game that Cordal won 1-4 to 1-3. There was a meeting called to form Officers for the club, the Officers were as follows Chairman: David Daly, Vice Do: Tom Fleming, Secretary: Paddy Murphy, and Treasurer: Paddy Riordan. In 1966 they won two Carnival Tournaments in which a Cup and a set of medals were presented. Scartaglin G.A.A. Club held their first annual Social in 1966 in which 650 people attended. In 1967 the club formed under age teams the U/14 team won the County Championship and Castleisland District League at the first attempt, which was a huge boost to the club. In 1969 the U/16 team won the County Championship (Rural), also in 1969 Scart senior team entered the County leagues.

Frank Kenny and Denis Riordan

Frank Kenny was a player on the Scartaglin team of 1964 and he also played a part in the re-organisation of the club along with Denis Riordan who fist touted the idea of a club in Scartaglin for the first time in 13 years

The following is Frank's account:

In November 1963 Cordal asked me to ask Denis Riordan to play for Cordal. Denis was playing for Castleisland Desmonds at that time. I met Denis at his home and asked him to play for Cordal as I was good friends with Denis, but he would not play for Cordal and Denis asked me to start a football club for Scart and he would play. My brother Dan was at home from College at the weekend and I told him I was starting a football club for Scartaglin, Dan told Frank to go ahead and he would play Frank then met Paddy Murphy and told him to go and meet Paddy Riordan. There was a dance held in the Hall (East End Ballroom) Scartaglin that Sunday night, and I got Michael O'Callaghan of the band to announce that there would be a meeting held in Daly's Hall on Friday night at 9 o'clock to form a new football club in Scartaglin. As we had no funds we held a dance in the afore mentioned hall and David Daly gave the hall for free. Frank came home one evening from work and his mother told him that Jack Lyons (Publican) wanted to see him. Frank continues I went up to Jack's Pub, he wanted to sell tickets and he also said that he would buy the jerseys if we had no funds. David Daly owner of the hall was the first Chairman of the club. Frank said that if Jack Lyons had lived that the football field would have been in 'Con Tangney's'. I rented Tangney's field for £16-10-5 and Cordal had rented as well but did not play, and Con Tangney got paid twice for the field. There was a District Board Meeting held in Castleisland as Mick Beehan was Chairman he was all for a club in Scartaglin and there was a Cordal motion for no Scart team but this was defeated. Frank admits mistakes were made from time to time about the team; there was also a bad feeling towards Cordal.

Re: Jack Lyons: If Jack Lyons had lived he used always say to me that I could buy Con 'Tangney's Field' for the club and we would be able to collect the money up the road for the games and park the cars in the village. Frank was the first Scart man to rent the field from Con Tangney.

Athletics

A pupil of Scartaglin National School comes from Glounlea about 2 and a half miles from Scartaglin Village. He hit the headlines for his long distance running in the U.S.A. and Canada in 1964 and 1965. His most famous victory was in the New York Marathon in March 1965. He came home ahead of a star studded field in a time of 2 hours 35 minutes and 2 seconds.

This was a world class performance from an outstanding athlete. In the corresponding race in 1964 Tom tied for 4th place in a time of 2 hours 31 minutes and 4 seconds. Just one month after the New York race in March 1965 he unwisely ran the Boston Marathon, in this race he finished in 22nd place in a time of 2 hours 32 minutes

and 58 seconds. In June 1965 only four months after The New York Marathon he again (probably unwisely) ran the Canadian Marathon, he was second in this race with a time of 2 hours 36 minutes and 5 seconds. During 1964 and 1965 he won several New York area Championship races. These races varied in distance from 6 miles to 20miles. All of these performances were achieved without the benefit of a coach, a sponsor a scholarship or a Sports Psychologist, he held down a full time job in the building trade. The wide variation in temperatures from the warm summers in New York to the sub-zero winters in Canada was far removed from the temperate climate of his native Sliabh Luachra. he returned to Ireland early in 1966 and for the next four years he was to the fore in the Munster area in road races and Cross Country running. Amongst his achievements were the following.

- 1 Kerry Senior Cross-Country Champion 4 times
- 2 Munster Novice Cross-Country Champion in 1966
- 3 Silver Medal in Munster Junior Cross-Country Championship 1966
- 4 Sixth place in Irish Junior Cross-Country Championship in 1966
- 5 Kerry Senior Road Running Champion 3 times
- 6 Twice winner of Annual Farranfore to Firies Road Race

Tom was introduced to Athletics by the legendary John J Crowley of Farranfore. Tom's entire career running in Ireland was with Farranfore Athletic, with his coaching, motivation and example the club enjoyed great success in Road and Cross Country running. Tom had all the qualities for a successful long distance runner. He had an economical stride, a teak tough body, and endless energy and supreme dedication. When you combine these qualities with a modest winner and a gracious loser you will understand how he was such an outstanding athlete and sportsman.

CHAPTER III (1965 - 1980)

1965

Castleisland District League Scartaglin 1-3 v Cordal 1-4

This was Scart's first game as a team in the Castleisland District League since 1951 and since the club was affiliated to the Kerry Co. Board in late autumn of 1964. It was played at Castleisland Sports Field on 7th of March and it turned out to be a cracker. When you consider that most of these players had been playing together under the Cordal banner for the previous 8 years it must have been a surreal situation to be in One incident during the game was when Tim Tiger Lyons (Cordal) took off on a solo run and the player who was chasing him fell forward on his face and caught Tim's trailing heel and broke his nose. The following Report is taken from the Castleisland Notes in 'The Kerryman' on the same game.

G.A.A.

Cordal defeated Scartaglin in the first round of the local District League, after a hard robust game at the Sportsfield. Scartaglin are newcomers to the League and formerly combined with Cordal, will need some more outings to add that bit of polish and teamwork, which only experience and match play can give. What was considered a "push over" for the Ballymac Co. Championship Club side turned out to be the reverse, when the inexperienced Scartaglin team called the tune for fully 50 minutes of the game, and were only subdued in the final minutes. Contrary to all the earlier results it was Currow and Ballymac qualified for the District League Final, Ballymac were going for 3 in a row but Currow stopped them in their tracks it was Curnow's first win in fourteen years (1951)

The San Francisco football team, the majority of who were exiles were on tour in Ireland in late August 1965 for a couple of weeks. They played two games in Kerry against Castleisland in Castleisland and they engaged the Kerry Juniors at Austin Stack Park Tralee.

The visitors had a lively game at Castleisland and finished the hour with a couple of points on hand although both teams were under strength. The visitors were also due to play John Mitchels but the game had to be shelved due to unforeseen circumstances, however Co. Board Chairman, Dr. Jim Brosnan, very kindly stepped into the breach and arranged for the San Francisco team to play the Kerry Junior team who were in training for their All-Ireland semi-final replay with Galway that particular weekend.

Among those in the visiting party was Sean Healy (Scartaglin), Michael Moriarty (Tralee), Rev Fr. Pat O'Shea, (West Kerry), Martin Quirke (Fenit), Martin Falvey (Aunascaul), Tom Murphy (Tralee), Peter Looney (Gneeveguilla), Tony O'Sullivan (Tralee), Colm Brennan (Killorglin), also assisting the team during their games were Tom O'Shea (West Kerry), Michael Quirke (Austin Stacks, Tralee) and Gerry Scollard (Austin Stacks). This was the first time that a team had travelled to this country from the west coast of the United States. Unfortunately several other members of the team could not make the trip due to business reasons.

The Kerry team in San Francisco had won the city championship two years running and were to contest their third on their return home. There were seven football teams and two hurling teams in the city.

Most of the visiting team stayed in Ireland until after the All-Ireland Final in September hoping to see Kerry regain the Sam Maguire (unfortunately this did not happen). They were also eagerly looking forward to the Festival of Kerry.

Sean Healy who is from Knockacorrin Scartaglin was a prominent Gaelic footballer now resident in San Francisco when interviewed gave the following information

I played football for the Kerry Team in San Francisco during the sixties and seventies. We won the San Francisco Championship (Senior) in 1963- 1964 and 1965. I was captain in 1964 (when in

fact they were the first team from the west coast to tour Ireland as mentioned in the previous page).

After retiring I was involved with the club for many years I was Chairman for six consecutive years, I am not involved now mainly because we are living along way out of the city.

Sean sent me a photograph of the winning San Francisco team (above) and describes who some of the players are. He says they were all immigrants from Kerry except Moriarty who was born in America of Irish parents his mother is Brosnan from Kilsarcon, he is a first cousin of Timmy Brosnan (St. Kieran's captain in 1988) The Taylor Brosnan (R.I. P.) would be his uncle. The other two Brosnans in the photo are from Kilsarcon sons of Con Brosnan (R.I.P.) and Denis Pa John would be their uncle, one of those Brosnan boys is now living and working in Killarney.

One of Sean's greatest regrets in Gaelic football is that he never got a chance to play for a Scartaglin team during his time at home in the fifties as there was no team due to the brake up over the infamous 'Parish League'. He said Scartaglin players lined out with either Cordal or Currow, as he was an apprentice carpenter in Lyrecrompane he played with Knocknagoshel in the Castleisland District League and with Lyrecrompane in North Kerry. Sean still lives in San Francisco and has served the Parish and the G.A.A. in particular well on foreign soil.

O'Connor Cup

Scartaglin played out a draw with Dr Crokes in late July I do not have the result, this would have been Scart's first outing against Dr Crokes who would have been formidable opposition for us at that time and indeed anytime. However I am reliable informed by some players from that game that they were beaten in the replay played on the 7th August and Tom Long the Kerry star did the damage scoring three goals. Frank Kenny came to the game late and when introduced kicked a point from the hands all of 60yds. Patsy O'Connor was unable to play in this game (replay) because he was away on Kerry duty when it took place also.







G.A.A. Annual General Meeting

The big issue on the Agenda was 'The Ban' or Rule 27, which did not allow Gaelic players to play or attend other games that were considered foreign games by the G.A.A., and if they did they would be banned from playing Gaelic Games. The vote was a straightforward one to retain or abolish the rule. Scartaglin G.A.A. club voted in favour of removal by 12 votes to 6 this was the trend mostly across the country and later in the year at Congress 'The Ban' was removed completely.

Report

Scartaglin's first real tilt at the O'Donoghue Cup also came in 1975 against Spa who two weeks previous had knocked Castleisland Desmonds out of the County Championship. Spa were undoubtedly the dominant team in East Kerry, and along, with Austin Stacks, at the very top in Kerry football. Their team was liberally sprinkled with All-stars and county stars from senior, U/21 and minor ranks. Such household names as Paudie O'Mahony, Donie O'Sullivan, Pat Casey, Tim O'Regan, Seanie Kelliher and Mick Gleeson formed the backbone of the team. In the O'Donoghue Cup quarterfinal they easily accounted for a highly rated Rathmore on a score of Spa 3 goals — 16 points to Rathmore's 0 goal- 8 points.

Semi-Final

The scene was set for a Scartaglin v Spa Semi-Final. Scart had a very young team the average age was only 22 years old, and the result was seen as a foregone conclusion in favour of Spa. However, Scart had trained hard that year, under the Spartan regime of their great trainer, Jack O'Connor. Leading up to the semi-final Scart were on an unbeaten run of 12 games, and took on the mighty Spa full of confidence. On a beautiful Friday evening, in Killarney's Fitzgerald Stadium, the scene was set for an epic encounter that would last long in the memory. The young Scart team set a blistering pace from the start, and on the tenth minute were rewarded with a goal from a penalty by John Murphy. Shortly afterwards Spa were rocked again when John Kerin beat all-star goalie Paudie O'Mahony with a left footed rocket. Spa were reeling and Scart were dominant throughout the field at centre back Michael Murphy put the shackles on Spa 6ft - 5ins Tim Regan, (O'Regan had scored 3 goals and 4 points against Rathmore in the quarter-final). All over the field Scart players responded, and with ten minutes to go, looked set for a famous victory. However, the Spa selectors responded, and with one last throw of the dice they brought Paudie O'Mahony from goals to mid-field. This proved a match-winning move, as O'Mahonys influence over a tiring Scart proved pivotal. He kicked three long-ranged free's over the bar to give Spa a 2 point lead entering the final minutes. One final attack saw corner-forward, Tom Fleming ghost in behind the Spa backs. The pass was slow in arriving and allowed Spa to re-group. However Fleming managed to get his shot away, but the ball struck the post and Spa prevailed to win by two points. Consequently Spa went on to beat Gneeveguilla in the final.

The Untimely Death of the great Pat Casey

Pat Casey to most of us that knew him found him to be a dear and gentle friend and if you were down due to some ailment, Pat would be the first to recognise this fact and the first to console you.

Pat was a quiet sincere and honest lad loved his sporting pursuits, which were Gaelic Football and Athletics to which he excelled at.

Pat was a goalkeeper on the G.A.A. team between the mid sixties and early 1970s and a pretty good one he was so much so that he earned the nickname 'Yasin' after the legendary Russian soccer goalkeeper Lev Yasin. Pat also played outfield occasionally at corner back on the Scartaglin team that won the East Kerry Junior Championship in 1972.

he was an outstanding athlete and won many races for the Scartaglin A.C. He really excelled at cross-country culminating in winning the Co Kerry Intermediate Cross-Country title on 31st December 1972 on home ground (Scartaglin) after an early battle with Frank Houlihan (St John's) and Pat Griffin (do).

In 1985 the Pat Casey Memorial Road Race was inaugurated to his memory, which was held in conjunction with 'The

Scartaglin Feile Ceóil' and the winner of the first running was none other than the renowned John Lenihan of An Riocht.

Later such athlete's as Jerry Kiernan (Irish Olympian) from Listowel took the Laurels in the 10-KM circuit of Scartaglin Village.

On Friday 26th of September 1975 a dark cloud hung over Scartaglin parish when the news of Pat Casey's death filtered through, a huge blow to his family and friends and the club who had lost a Chairman at the tender age of 27.

Pat never sought the limelight in life, so maybe it is fitting that he should have the Scartaglin football pitch named after him to honour his memory, indeed this is exactly what happened in the mid-eighties at a meeting of the Scartaglin G.A.A. Club insuring that his name is synonymous with sporting activities in the parish of Scartaglin.

At that time Spa were the champions of East Kerry football and knocked Austin Stacks off their perch in winning the County League. So it was no mean achievement by Scartaglin football team just unlucky to meet a Legion team bang in form. Jerome O Driscoll our normal full back was moved to full forward for this game and scored Scart's only goal.

Con Dennehy a native of Currow, was an outstanding Athlete with Scartaglin Athletic Club in the 1970s and 1980s. In the 1960s and early 1970s he won Tipperary, East Munster and Munster Colleges with Rockwell College in Cross Country, the 2000mts Steeplechase, 1 Mile and 5000mts.

In 1972 he was a member of St Finbarrs A.C. Cork winning a place on the Cork Novice team for the Munster Championships. Moving to Kerry in 1973 he joined Scartaglin A.C. He won the Kerry Novice and Kerry Intermediate Cross Country titles in 1973, and was second in the Kerry Junior Championships. That year he was also second overall in the Kerry Senior Cross Country League. In

1974 he was a member of the Kerry team that won their first All-Ireland senior medals at the National Inter Counties championships in Mallow. At the Currow 4 mile road race in 1974 he set a new course record for the 'Top Road' circuit of 19 minutes 21 seconds a record that still stands today. In 1974 he led Scartaglin to Kerry senior championship medals in Cross Country and Road Championships taking second overall individual award in the 4 mile Road Championship and second overall in the Senior Road League. He also won the Scartaglin Winter Road League and represented Kerry at all levels in Cross Country and Road Running from 1973 to 1980. In 1974 he won the Kerry Intermediate 3000mts title and Munster medals in the 2 mile championships and 1 mile championship of Kerry. In 1974/1975 he represented

Scartaglin on the Kerry B.L.E. County Board as a Munster Delegate and Deputy President. In later years he served as P.R.O. and Kerry and Kerry Athletic Coach for Cross Country and Road Running. In 1974/1975/1976 he won Road Races in Currow, Glenbeigh, Beaufort, Scartaglin, Knocknagoshel and Ardfert in addition to winning events at sports meetings all over Kerry.

In 1975 he was a silver medal winner in the Kerry Cross Country and Road League while in 1974 he was 4th in the B" section of the All-Ireland Inter Firm Road Race and also won the All-Ireland hospital 4 mile Road Race in 1976. In 1985 he organised and sponsored the Pat Casey Memorial Road Race in Scartaglin, a race that he organised and promoted each year up to 2000.

The Game

Scart were beaten by a bang in form Beale team who boasted no less than 4 County players that is apart from the outstanding performance of Billy Fleming who was marking Eoin 'Bomber' Liston belied his young years at full back he had just turned 19.

The game was played in Castleisland and it had poured rain all day but it did clear up just around game time. In fact most of the players I spoke to wondered if it would be played at all due to the inclement weather, this would also account for the fact that nobody travelled to do a report on the game. Scartaglin won the toss and elected to play against the wind in the first half. Scart acquitted themselves well and thought they had a great chance behind only by two points at half time after playing into a storm.

Towards the end of the first half also when Scart centre forward Tim Dineen missed a golden opportunity with only the keeper to beat. In the second half Hugh O'Connor came off the bench for full forward Jerome O'Driscoll and it had an immediate effect when he scored a good goal that breathed new life into Scart hopes of taking the title. However it only ignited the Beale team and they went on to run out easy winners in the end

Unfortunately nothing went right for Scart on the day either and they lost heavily in the finish going down 4-10 to 0-2. The report stated that Gneeveguilla scored at will near the end of this game.

Scartaglin's biggest draw back in the 1960's and 70's was the fact that they had no field of their own and therefore could not train properly for big occasions this applied to young and Old alike

It was a fantastic feeling when you consider they had lost the two previous Final's by narrow margins. "The Kerryman" headline was "Scartaglin Come Good in Style" and they (Scartaglin) played a brand of football vastly superior to what one might expect in the Novice grade.

Ballymacelligott were their opponents on this occasion and with their long history of Senior Co. Championship wins 1891, 1894, 1895, 1918) it made it all the more Sweeter.

Match Report

Unfavourable weather Condition's prevailed on the day, the rain poured down and was driven by a fairly strong breeze. Scart elected to play with the breeze in the first half after winning the toss. Right from the start they got stuck in but unfortunately Ballymac scored the first point in the form of Mike O'Connor. Scart were on level terms within two minutes from the boot of Dave Buckley. Scart then took the lead when Jim O' Connor pointed from about 35 yards out. Soon after this Scart missed an excellent chance of a Goal. For a while Scart wasted some possession and in fact they did not score until the 18th minute when full back Paudie Horan went the length of the field and kicked an inspiring point. Ballymac must have been happy at not conceding so little against the breeze. Freddie Casey playing well on the forty won a ball the hard way and shot accurately between the posts. Mike Murphy followed with a point after Casey being fouled. After this Scart finished the half in style when Tim Riordan and Denis Horan landed excellent points to leave the score 0-7 to 0-1 at half time. Horan's point came after a marvellous run by Mike Murphy (Direen) who was surely Scartaglin's man of the match? Scart lost a great Chance

of a goal when full forward John Murphy's pass was over hit and out of reach of a colleague; Scart should have tagged on a few more points before half time to strengthen their position. Scart led at half time but the question was had they scored enough, so then they prepared themselves for the Ballymac onslaught they knew what we had to do if they wanted to win. Ballymac must have been well pleased with themselves at half time and must have felt they had the winning of the game. Ballymac opened brightly in the second half and had a point from a free from the boot of Michael Kerins.

But the Scart rearguard held firm under pressure and was well marshalled by (Vice Captain) Brendan Riordan who had a stormer all through the second half. Scart's next score came in the 43 minute when Freddie Casey scored a fabulous point after a splendid solo run. Two minutes later

That is until 53rd minute this was when Mike O'Connor crashed a mighty drive to the net. Suddenly Scart's position was threatened and when Michael Kerins landed a point from a free to narrow the gap to three points (0-9) to (1-3). The scene now looked set for a grandstand finish. Scart opened their account with a Jim O'Connor point from play in the 21st minute this was followed by a good point from Tim Riordan in the23rd minute. "Dino" Dowling had a point for Ballydonoghue in the 25th minute. John Murphy (Scart) closed out the half with a point to leave the score 1-4 to 0-3.

On resumption Scart were first out of the blocks when Mossie Kerin popped over a point in the 32nd minute this was followed by a point from Tim Riordan three minutes later. Michael Kissane (Ballydonoghue) had a point from a free. Scart then scored a good goal from the boot of Denny O'Sullivan after some good outfield work from Tim Riordan and John Murphy to draw level in the 41st minute. The Replay (17th November)

Scartaglin senior team pulled off "The O'Sullivan Cup" for the first time in our history, although we did win The East Kerry Junior Championship in 1972. This is the first one since it has been renamed the O'Sullivan Cup in 1975.

This was the second epic encounter between these two teams in the space of a month. In the drawn game the last ten minutes was nail biting. Gneeveguilla got the opening score inside two minutes, Scart were level on four through Freddie Casey. On resumption Scart added a point through a John Horan free in the 2nd minute. In the 5th minute Gneeveguilla struck for a cracking goal, further pressure by Gneeveguilla yielded three unanswered points. With ten minutes remaining in the game the two sides were deadlocked at 1-5 to 0-8 The scene was set for grandstands finish with both defences under pressure and it was a matter of who broke first. But Scartaglin egged on by a fanatical sideline support, pegged back the deficit with two points inside a minute from Joe Casey and JohnO'Donoghue to earn them a second bite at the cherry.

In fact, substitute Denis Kerin had a chance to steal the Championship for Scartaglin in the final minutes, but he delayed his shot, and was penalised for over-carrying by referee Ritchie Williams. with a successful free after 53 minutes, the likelihood of a Scartaglin comeback appeared remote.

But they breed a durable type of character in Scartaglin, with their heart in the right place, and having drawn level, there no reason why they shouldn't approach the replay with confidence.

In full back James Flynn Scartaglin have a solid defender as you'll find in junior football, John Barrett and Diarmuid Murphy gave little away and Hugh O'Connor played with a lion's heart in midfield. Of their forwards Joe Casey was always busy, instigating many productive attacks, while Jeremiah Dunlea looked dangerous in possession.

William O'Connor and John O'Donoghue were the principal score takers. Freddie Casey was on the first 15 and Jeremiah Dunlea came on as a sub for Davy Walsh (Cordal). Both players acquitted themselves well.







Ted O'Connor (R.I.P.) (Ballahantourig and Coolnageiragh)

Ted O'Connor had a glittering career as a player a teak tough defender of the old stock whose reputation preceded him on the fields of Kerry football. Ted was right there in 1964 when the club was first affiliated to the County Board after their fine win in the Knocknagoshel Harvest Festival. Ted had the unique

distinction in 1966 of captaining the Scartaglin team to three Carnival Tournaments wins against formidable opposition Kilcummin, Rathmore and Knocknagree. On the administration front Ted served as Secretary of the senior club from 1986-1989 and over saw the official opening of the new playing pitch. He was also the first Chairman of Bórd nÓg Ciarraí as his own sons came to prominence in the club; he also trained many successful under age teams in the club and in the district of Castleisland.

Football wasn't his only love he also loved the dogs both greyhounds and gun dogs a sport he was also well respected in and he trained many a good one. When the news of Ted's sudden and unexpected death was announced it sent shock waves around the parish leaving his wife Mary with a relatively young family. Ted was in fact returning from a sporting occasion when the fatal incident occurred.

- 6. The 1888 date reefers to the first mention of Scartaglin teams playing football in Maurice Moynihan's letter in 'The Kerry Sentinel' of that year.
- 7. The 1964 date reefers to the re-organisation of the club in that year.

Scartaglin 2-7 v Listry 1-9

In a close and exciting East Kerry Novice Championship Final at Fitzgerald Stadium, Scartaglin took victory over Listry but it took a last minute save from Scartaglin goalkeeper Donie Murphy to prevent Listry getting the winning goal. Murphy plunged to his left to save a shot from James Mannix, which was goal bound and this preserved Scartaglin's two point winning margin.

It was a terrific victory by a very young Scartaglin side, which had seven minors on duty with two of those under 16. Listry though will count themselves unlucky, as they had the physical strength, but they could never get the better of a dogged Scartaglin side, who worked hard for each other and deservedly took the victory.

Scartaglin opened the scoring with a John Culloty free after three minutes, and two minutes later, came what would prove be a decisive goal. Wing-forward Daniel Murphy sent in a high ball, which dipped over the head of Listry goalkeeper Ger Tangney and into the net. A minute later Listry got off the mark, James Mannix pointing, John Culloty responding for Scartaglin.

The game was a close affair, swinging from side to side, with Daniel Murphy and Michael Dwyer swapping points to leave Scartaglin 1-3 to 0-2 up. The to and fro nature of the game continued for the rest of the half, John Culloty and Danny Healy exchanging points, before James Mannix hit a late Listry point to leave them trailing by three points at the end of the half, 1-4 to 0-4. Listry used their strength

to good effect in the second half to cut the gap, and early points from Danny Healy and Patrick Fleming left just one point between the sides. After eight minutes Listry took the lead for the first time in the game corner forward, Mike Dwyer, who had moved out the field, went on an amazing solo run and shot to the net past Donie Murphy.

James Mannix and Padraig Reidy swapped scores before Scartaglin's second goal came midway through the half. It was a combination effort between Scartaglin midfielders, Mike Coakley's free into the Listry square fielded by Pa O'Connor who turned and goaled. Listry responded immediately, James Mannix leaving just a point between the sides, as they put Scartaglin under severe pressure in the closing stages of the game. Scartaglin's goalkeeper Donie Murphy was equal to the task making a terrific save with seven minutes to go.

Scartaglin broke up field and Mike Coakley gave them breathing space with a neat point, before Murphy's terrific save from Mannix kept Scartaglin ahead. Michael Dwyer had a late Listry point in injury time, but the whistle blew shortly after as Scartaglin took the victory.

Marguerite Coakley was born on the October 5th 1987 to Margaret and Mossie Coakley of Carker. She was the

youngest of five children, the other family members being Tim, Oonagh, Aileen and Mike. From a very young shining star in sports circles and was a truly promising prospect showing tremendous potential for the future.

She was always kicking a football or shooting a basketball on the lawn in front of her home from a very young age. The love she had for football and basketball at this early age blossomed forth when

she became a member of Scartaglin Cumann na mBunscoil football team which, won three County titles in a row from 1989 to 2000. She won numerous awards with Scartaglin Ladies Football Team at U/12, U/14, U/16, minor and Junior level. From the ability and Skills shown by her at local level it was only a matter of time until Marguerite graduated to the inter-county scene in football. She was a member of the Kerry U/14 and U/16 ladies football teams and lined out with Kerry at U/16 level in the Munster Final against Cork at Austin Stack Park, Tralee on the 12th May.

This sadly was the last time that Marguerite wore the green and gold of Kerry. She did however line out with her beloved Scartaglin on the 28th June at U/16 level against Abbeydorney played in Scartaglin. Basketball was Marguerites other favourite sport. She won many honours in this code having represented Kerry, St Mary's Castleisland, St Joseph's Secondary School and Scartaglin Youth Club. Just after her untimely death Marguerite was due to travel to Mosney for the for the E.S.B. Community Games Finals with St Mary's U/16 Basketball team.

Marguerite had a wonderful personality and was very popular, outgoing, and bubbly and enjoyed her young life to the full. She was an inspirational young lady who really excelled at her sports and served as a role model to all the youth of the locality.

August 2002 was a very sad month in the sporting history of Scartaglin Ladies Football Club as on the 9th of August Marguerites life was ended so quickly and prematurely and was something that was really very hard to accept and her loss at such a young age was immeasurable to County and club, but most of all to her heartbroken family.

As a tribute to her popularity all the clubs in Kerry turned up in their County and club colours on the evening of her removal of her remains and on the following day for her burial providing a guard of honour on both days. To honour Marguerites memory Scartaglin Ladies Football Club organises an annual tournament, which is called "The Marguerite Coakley Memorial Ladies Football Tournament" which is held in Scartaglin G.A.A. grounds each year.

At County level the family donated a wonderful cup in her memory; this cup is presented to the winners of the U/16 football County Championship team. The family also donated a trophy to St Mary's Basketball Club in Castleisland in her memory. This competition is run off in conjunction with the "Annual St Mary's Basketball Blitz" at Christmas. Finally may God grant Marguerite everlasting life in the playing fields of Heaven?

There is no doubt that Scart were the better side on the day but had Fossa taken half their chances that came their way during a first half that they dominated for long periods then the result would have been a lot closer. Scartaglin, apart from a period late in the game, took most of the chances that came their way, and had seven scores from play compared to just two for Fossa.

East Kerry Senior Championship (O'Donoghue Cup) 'Scartaglin shock Legion'

1st Rd Scartaglin 1-12 Legion 0-10 at Scartaglin Sat 27th May According to the report in "The Kingdom" on the 1st June, it was a comprehensive and thoroughly deserved victory in The East Kerry Senior Championship on home soil. The winners took the game by the scruff of the neck right from the through in and had a fancied Legion side in disarray as they built up a seven point lead early in the game.

Legion came more into the game thereafter, but Scart had laid down a marker with that early surge and had the confidence to withstand the best that the town side could throw at them in the second half. With Tim Coakley in control around the middle of the field and using the wind advantage to good effect, Scart started in whirlwind fashion and had four points on the board in as many minutes courtesy of Pa Rahilly (2), Jimmy O'Donoghue and livewire full forward, Daniel Murphy. 



G.A.A. Club Chairmen, Secretaries and Treasurers

In the early years much of the responsibility fell on one man to run a team or a club. In Scart we had many incidences of this with Hugh Daly at the turn of the century and Ned Murphy and Guard Mulvihill in the 1920s. Jerry Lyons took over the mantle in the 1930s and Tim Kerins to a lesser extent. Then we had the huge influence of Rev.Fr Christy Griffin which took us through to the early 1960s. In the late 50s many Scart people served as Officers in the Cordal/Scartaglin Club. I am sure there were others but we do not have any information or records. It is quiet a possibility that we have a record when it comes to Chairmen. When the club

went through a sticky patch in 1969 and Chairman David Daly stepped down, the club found it impossible to find a new Chairman. The club players held at a meeting and put forward Tom Fleming jnr, himself a player at the time and only sixteen years old and probably the youngest Chairman in Kerry and possibly Ireland. When Paddy Riordan and Paddy Murphy introduced Tom to the then Chairman of the County Board, Dr Jim Brosnan he thought it was Chairman of Board nOg, because he looked so young. However Tom went on to be Chairman for three years 1969 to 1972, and served a further two seasons as Secretary.

They Serve on Foreign Soil Jerry O'Donoghue (Knockrour)

Jerry O'Donoghue love affair with Gaelic Football began in 1955 when he listened to the legendary Micheal O'Hehir radio commentary of the All-Ireland Football Final between Kerry and Dublin.

With his brother James, Jerry listened intently outside his parents home in Knockrour, Scartaglin as the Kingdom recorded a 0-12 to 0-6 victory.

His own career with Scartaglin began, as a juvenile but first tasted success when lining out for St Pats Secondary School Castleisland in the mid 1960's. In 1966 for the first time in the history of the school, St Pats beat St Brendan's College Killarney in the Kerry Inter School's Final; Jerry was the team's goalkeeper.

The following two years he lined out with Castleisland District Minor team (outfield) and the second year he was part of that successful minor team that defeated Austin Stacks in the final.

When he moved to Dublin to study Accountancy while working with Lister's in Dorset St he joined 'An Riocht' the Kerry team in Dublin managed by the inimitable Bart Moriarty. During his three-year stay in the Capital Jerry lined out at centre field for the 'Clan Na Gael' U/21 team that beat St Vincent's in the County Final in 1971 as well as the Blanchardstown senior team.

Jerry then immigrated to London where he met an old school friend Dan Ahern who persuaded him to play with 'The Kingdom' they won the League and The Tipperary Cup that year.

The Kingdom went on to win six Championships in a row from 1973 onwards Jerry continued to play with The Kingdom until 1973 where he had to make a choice between his livelihood of playing music (his other love)

the Band and the music won out. However Jerry never lost his affinity with the club and was instrumental in the amalgamation of The Kingdom and Kerry Gael's almost a decade ago..Down through the years he has been an avid supporter both morally and financially he currently mans the Secretary job and previously served as treasurer for 10 years.

Jerry is also a huge Kerry G.A.A. fan where he flies across the Channel for almost all Kerry games. He is also the proud owner of 'O'Donoghue's Irish Bar ' 174 Gold Hawlk Road, Sheppard's Bush, London, a veritable home from home for Gaels in London. It is also renowned for it's home cooked food at 'Margaret's Kitchen' and offers music and dancing five nights a week.

Jerry is one of four brothers the others being James, Tim and John who have all played for Scartaglin at some time in their playing careers. James is the Scartaglin's current Delegate to the County Board and John was a member of the Scartaglin Panel that won the Novice Championship of 1983.

Patsy Riordan has a long association with Colleges Gaelic Football, which stretches back to his College days at St Patrick's College in Castleisland. Patsy was a member of the team that won the Kerry Colleges Co Championship title (Paul Russell Cup) in June 1966 so is it any wonder that he should have success in another county.

Patsy is now resident in Drumsna Co Leitrim where he teaches in the local College and being a Kerry man I suppose it was inevitable that he would become involved in the football team. Patsy first big success was winning the Connacht Colleges Senior Championship title in 1980, which was no mean achievement. In 1995 they again won the Connacht Vocational 'A' senior championship title and reached the All-Ireland semi-final.

In 1996 they repeated the dose again winning the Connacht Senior Colleges title and reaching the All-Ireland semi-final where they played Rathmore and were extremely unlucky to lose after taking them to a replay.

Patsy's team eventually went on to win the Connacht senior football league title in the 2001. Patsy keeps the Kerry and Scartaglin flags flying in the Connacht province.

Jumpers Folklore Extracts (31st May 1938)

Fr Shanahan Story received from Dan Clifford of Barna, Scartaglin, Co Kerry. Aged 85 yrs

He said that Fr. Shanahan was a great jumper that he once jumped over a Ravine. At this time he was going to School in Paris and almost got expelled from the School but he begged pardon on his knees (according to the writer) and his superiors let him go. After this he was ordained a priest.

He was a curate in this Parish (Scartaglin). One day there was a crowd of people drawing turf to the Parish Priest and in the evening when they had finished building the Rick of turf the Parish Priest laid a bet of a pound with Fr Shanahan that he would not jump the Rick of turf. The two pounds were put down on a stone and Fr Shanahan cleared the Rick and collected his bet.

However the Parish Priest went to the Bishop and told him that he had jumped the Rick but unknown to the Parish Priest Fr Shanahan followed on horseback. When he arrived at the Palace yard he tied his horse to the gate and he took a few steps back and jumped the Palace gate. At that time the Bishop happened to be looking out the window and saw him and he said to the Parish Priest "God put Wings in this mans heart" and you want me to clip them but I will not.

John O'Leary of Scartaglin could jump over an open razor placed on the biggest horses back going into the Village of Scartaglin.

Dan Kearney Scartaglin jumped over a gate twice as high as himself.

In our Village (Scartaglin) they're lived a great athlete named Mike O'Leary who jumped the Old Chapel gate the

onlookers were the Gárda Siochána and they were amazed at the sight.

Jack O'Sullivan of Adriville jumped the Old Chapel gate in Scartaglin it was supposed to be 61/2 ft

William Horan from lower Dromulton jumped a gate 6 ft. high.

Tom Brosnan Scartaglin jumped the river Flesk that is 20 ft wide

Jim Leary Scartaglin jumped the best ever seen, he jumped the head of a rake which was 7ft-8ins high.

James Leary Scartaglin jumped the Forge Glen.

Michael W O'Leary Scartaglin jumped the Chapel gate which was 61/2

Strong Men

Daniel O'Connell Knockrour lifted a stone, which was 15cwt into a cart.

Denis W Horan (Direen) took a donkey in his arms inside in a trench and put him out on the bank he then took the car and put it out.

......

Another famous strong man was Dan M Horan of Knockeenahone he carried two firkins from John C. Horan's house down a cliff and up a hill to his own house a distance of about a mile.

Donal Kearney was another strong man famous for lifting stones and rocks reputed to be the strongest man in Scartaglin.

Michael Crowley (Direen) put a bag of potatoes in over a rail; John Horan and his brother witnessed this achievement. Pat O'Connor lifted a roller. Walker's Jim Downey (Ballantourigh) walked to Killarney a distance of about 11 miles in 2 and half hours.Michael Clifford (Barna) walked to Tralee a distance of about 20 miles and home again in a day. Student Han Healy Knockacorrin, Scartaglin, Co Kerry. Story Teller John Healy same address Age 46 years Denis Cullinane Scartaglin walked to Cork in a day Told by Humphrey O'Leary (Mount) Written by Mick O'LearyMick Culloty (Goulan) walked to Cork City in one day exactly he set off in the morning very early and arrived home for sunset. It was a powerful walk and one could not walk to Cork now in a week not to mind a day. Written by Humphrey O'Leary (Mount) Told by Free O'Leary Runners Mick Clifford (Barna) ran from Co Cork to the West of Kerry along with a horse he reached Dingle 15 minutes before the horse. Paddy Nolan (Knockrour) ran 2 miles and a half in 10 minutes. Timothy Leary (Ballantourigh) ran 3 miles in 12 minutes. Patrick Donovan (Kilsarcon) ran from Castleisland to Scartaglin, which is about 4 miles in 20 minutes. Maurice Kerin ran from Kilsarcon he came the near way and the horse came around the road. They had a bet down and Maurice won it. Michael Clifford (Barna) three miles east of Scartaglin, he ran a mile in five minutes. Jim Boyle of Leaha was also a great runner.

'Daly the Racer' (Daly an Ráta)

Daly the Racer was born near Kilsarcon about the year 1811; he was the greatest runner of his time in the 32 counties of Ireland. It is said he met a man in Cordal by the name of Farmer from Waterford, before they started the

race Daly bought some biscuits and was eating them from start to finish of the race and he beat Farmer without any trouble. On another occasion there was a wager laid to run a pack of bloodhounds. Daly was covered with blood in order the hounds would follow him. A half a mile from where Daly was to escape, the hounds were at his heels, he thought of a plan, and he ran on top of a narrow ditch, all the hounds could not find the scent and so Daly made good his escape and won the wager.

On another occasion he met a man in Scartaglin by the name of Rawlins. Rawlins was also a great runner and he challenged Daly to a race. When they began the race Daly went slowly, and he left Rawlins pass him out in a round of the field, but when the came together in the second last round Daly ran his best and he won the race without any trouble. On another occasion a circus man who had the reputation of being the best runner in Europe challenged him.

The Half-Sirs around Limerick backed the circus man and all the Half-Sirs in Kerry backed Daly so the wagers ran into hundreds of pounds. Daly was blind in one eye and the Limerick Half- Sirs planned to get another good runner to dress exactly like the circus man and to run the first part of the race with Daly then slip into the place where the circus man was hiding and then the circus man started off the last half of the race, but after all the plans Daly won the race and the Kerry Half-Sirs won the wagers. However this was his last race ever running as he was throwing up blood a long time after coming home. Well old Daly An Ráta as we used call him is along time dead, he is buried in Kilsarcon Cemetery in the front of the Alter in the old ruins where his headstone may be seen.

Won a county minor championship medal with St Kierans in 1994 Pa adaptable in any one of the six forward positions he has lightning pace, once scored 1-13 points in a minor league semi-final, played Co Championship football with St Kierans, minor and senior. Played on Mark O'Shea in Co Minor Semi-Final 1997 and scored a goal.

Brendan comfortable any place in the back line, probable suited to wing-back because of pace, good man marker. Played minor Co Championship with St Kierans. His most notable achievement to date winning an All-Ireland Vocational medal with Kerry Vocational Schools 2002.

John McNally was born in Dungannon Co Tyrone. He married May Kenny (R.I.P.) of Counguilla, Scartaglin and they settled down in Counguilla and had a family of three Marian, Shane and Kevin. John first interest in football began at the age of eight when he saw Tyrone play Galway in the All-Ireland semi- final of 1954. The famous players that were on show

that day Ieggy Jones, Jackie Taggert and Jody O'Neill of Tyrone and Jack Mahon, Frankie Stockwell and Sean Purcell of Galway.

John's first involvement with the Scartaglin G.A.A. club was as Treasurer in 1979 and played no small part in the purchase of the playing field, from there he progressed to Trainer of the senior team. John had instant success as Trainer reaching three Novice County Finals in a row 1981-1983 losing the first two to Ardfert and Currow respectively by narrow margins and winning our first County Championship in 1983 defeating Ballymacelligott in the Final on a score-line of 1-4 to 0-9. John had able deputies in Jerome Driscoll, Jack O'Connor and Jerry Lyons. John's training was so successful that he had thirty plus at his sessions each night some weeks included four nights. He was touted on many an occasion to train the District team (Castleisland) and Castleisland Rangers and they eventually got their man in 1988 under the new name of St Kierans Scart's loss was St Kierans gain because on their first attempt they won the Senior County Championship instant success again for John.

John's next step up the ladder was as Trainer of the Kerry Junior team also with some success and later as selector with the Kerry Senior team it was quiet a roller coaster ride. In the year 2003 it was fitting for John to see his beloved Tyrone team win the All-Ireland title for the first time in their history and I am sure there was no prouder man than John in Croke Park that September day. In john's chosen profession he is a Secondary School Teacher at St Patrick's College Castleisland nowadays he still keeps his eye on School teams mostly as he has retired from club and county duties, he now resides in Tralee. Whenever great football teams are talked about in Scartaglin or for that matter Kerry in the context of team trainer's John McNally's name will always remain at the top. John's contribution you will always have a special place in the hearts of Scartaglin Folk

Jerome O'Driscoll

Jerome O'Driscoll came to Scartaglin with his good wife Carmel from their then residence in Castleisland in 1973 to settle in the Village. Jerome employers were the 'Beamish Drinks Group' and Carmel's profession was a nurse. They went on to have a family of six, five girls and one

boy of who they were immensely proud of all being a huge asset to the community in general. Jerome right from the start was involved in the G.A.A. as a player of exceptional talent and served the club for many years firstly as a full back and there was none better almost impossible to get past him, later as a full forward were on his first start scored a brilliant goal against the mighty Legion in 1976 O'Donoghue Cup Semi-Final. After his involvement as a player he really came into his own as an Official highly respected and an astute one he was.

Jerome served as an Officer at every level in the senior club and at Bord nÓg and at District level. He was also involved in Scór and Scór nÓg and indeed drama, singing, recitation and Question time.

He was also a fine singer of Irish and Ballads and won many competitions at District and at County level. He along with John McNally and Jer Riordan were instrumental in the purchasing of the local playing pitch.

Before he came to Co Kerry Gerome had gained notoriety in both hurling and football with his native club Bantry Blues in Co Cork a player of immense talent respected by all his team mates. Gerome was also a member of the selection committee that won the first County Novice Championship in 1983. He still keeps a close eye on emerging talent in the club as he attends many games and now has three grandsons who all play with the club. Gerome is one of the true gentlemen of the Scartaglin,s G.A.A club a always encouraging young and old players alike and always the good word.




