At the present time there are four families of the Tangneys living at Listry, this family came there from ballymacElligott. Denis of Knockacullig m. Ellen O'Connor of Coolroe Milltown. Issue Nicholas, Pat, Denis, Jeremiah, Thomas, Charles, Abbie, Cathleen and Nellie.

Nicholas went to America. He m. there and has issue.

Pat Tangney went to America also. He too m. there and has issue.

Denis Tangney went to Castlemartyr, Co. Cork. He bought a f. there and m. Bridie Colbert of Ballymacoda. They have issue.

Jeremiah became a priest in the American mission. He is dead.

Thomas and Charles are at home unm. Abbie Tangney is at home also and unm.

Cathleen Tangney is a nun in Westmeath. She is St. Immaculate of the Order of St. Joseph.

Nellie Tangney is a nun in the Uganda Mission.

Mickael O'Neill of Knockataggilmore came from Ballycar Co. Clare about forty years ago and settled a labourer's cottage built in the lands of John J. Horgan portion of which now belong to Brian Kelly. was m. to Nora Coffey of Ringmount in the parish of Currens. Issue - Mick, Martin, Joe, Lily, Nora Mary.

Mick died when young. Martin and Mary went to America. Nora went to Australia. She is m. there and has issue. Eily and Joe are working in England. Both are unm.

THE FLEMINGS OF COOLICK

In the parish register of births (Kilcummin parish) there is recorded that many different families of Flemings lived in the townland of Coolick. It is very probable that those families were related to one another but it cannot now be ascertained with any degree of correctness how near such relation was. thing is certain viz., that all of them held portions of land of varying extent in this townland. Many of them occupied portions of the mountain part of the farm held under lease dated 1811 by a John P. Fleming. Other families besides Flemings lived in this mountain farm for we find that at the present day some of its fields bear names associated with families of Barry, Fernane, Moriarty and Kerrisk. All those were what was called at the time subtenants and from time to time were transferred to better farms then a be obtained under middlemen or small landlords who held large tracts under the descendants of Undertakers to whom such were granted after the Elizabethan and Williamite wars. There are many now living who say that all the Fleming families of Coolick were descended from a common ancestor but the cannot be vouched for at least from traditional sources and indeed it does not much matter now. According to a tradition of a family or families of Flemings were brought to Coolick by a captain Brown in the seventeenth century. This Captain Browne was a member of the Browne family from whom the present Earl of Kenmare is descended. He was known locally as Lord Dunrine, but there is nothing in our historical records to warrant his right to such a title. It is recorded in Smith's History of Kerry that a Captain Browne lived in a castle in the townland of Ardagh, Kilcummin. The remains of this castle are still to be seen and there is no doubt but that parts of it were used in building some farmhouses in the district round about. This castle at Ardagh was the residence first built by the Borwne family who afterwards went to Molahiffe after having acquired through mortgage from the last MacCarthy More a very large part of East Kerry, and which afterwards came to be known as The Kenmare Estate. The struggle between the descendants of this MacCarthy More and the Brownes for this territory, afterwards was indeed a very interesting one and it is detailed in many of out Kerry histories. The middlemen and tenants of the Brownes were raided without mercy by the followers of Daniel MacCarthy - the Robin Hood of Munster as he was styled, and Captain Browne was forced to select strong positions here and there in that part of the Kenmare Estate under his charge. To such strongholds he brought numbers of

fighting men to meet the onslaughts of Daniel MacCarthy's men. Coolick has one of these positions. Here the Captain built a house near a strong fort or Lios which over 100 years ago was a notable landmark in the neighbourhood. This fort owing to a high and steep earthen ditch or fence which surrounded it was eminently suited for defence and it must have been selected by the Captain as a place to keep watch for the marauders who constantly harassed him and his people. It is thought now that he brought here a number of families to whom he gave portions of land in the Coolick townland. In the course of time the Captain gave this house to a family named Fleming whose descendants will be dealt with in this genealogical effort. With this house he also gave a farm of over 200 acres to this Fleming family. One half of this f. was mountain, land portion of which was sublet by the Flemings to a number of tenants who reclaimed much of it from time to time. The first member or head of this family of which there is now an account was a Patrick Fleming who had a son named John to succeed him as owner ef both farms. There were other children also but nothing is known of them save that one of them, a man, became an engineer who was drowned in the St. Lawrence River in Canada while surveying for the English in this then but little-known land. A daughter of his was m. to John Healy of clashnagarrane whose descendants have been dealt with already. In 1811 John Fleming got a lease of both farms on the lives of his son, Pat, a Father O'Riordan and another. This lease, by the way, did not expire till 1890 on the death of Fr. O'Riordan who lived to a very advanced age.

John Fleming was m. to a Hickey from Castleisland. Issue - Pat, Tom, Hanora, Ellen, Maria, Hannal

and Margaret.

Maurice J. Fleming got his f.f. and m. Minnie O'Connor of Dunrine. Issue - Rita, John, Jerome, Bridget and Pat.

John is a civic guard. He lives in Dublin, is m. and has issue.

Rita became a nurse in England. She is m. and has no issue.

Jerome, Bridget and Pat are at home unm.

Minnie J. Fleming m. Pat Teahen of Inch in half his f.f. Issue - John, Eily, Eugene, May and Margaret.

John Teahen is a N.T. and lives at Castleisland. He is unm. (1938).

Eily is a teacher in Glasgow, unm.

Margaret is a N.T. in Cork City.

Mary and Eugene are at home unm.

Maggie J. Fleming m. Tim Wren of Brackhill, Castlemaine. Issue - Pat, John, Mick, Eileen, Margaret, Mary, Maurice, Ellie, Con and Julia.

Pat, John, Mick and Con died when young. Eileen is a nurse in England. She m. recently. Julia is a nurse in England. The rest are at home unm.

Con J. Fleming became a N.T. He taught in the Anabla N.S., Kilcummin and is now (1938) on pension. He m. Hannah O'Sullivan the teacher of the Anabla Girls' N.S. Issue - John, Rita, Mary, Eily, Pat, Nora, Christina.

Rita C. Fleming became a N.T. She is at present teaching in the Central Model Schools, Dublin. She m. recently Pat Houlihan a large dairy farmer who lives near the city of Dublin.

Mary and Lily are teaching in Glasgow - unm.

Nora C. Fleming is a nun in the Mercy Convent, Killarney. Her name in Religion is Sister Ethna.

Christina C. Fleming is a nurse in America, unm. Hannah is a nurse in London, unn Pat C. Fleming is a priest at present (1938) in China.

John J. Fleming was educated for the priesthood in Maynooth College. He left the Irish Mission and is at present rector in St. Anne's parish, Whitevale St., Glasgow.

Hannah J. Fleming lives in Killarney, unm.

Nora J. Fleming went to America. She m. there a Mr. O'Leary and they have issue. Ellie J. Fleming m. Timothy O'Connor of Dunrine. They went to America and have issu Michael J. Fleming went to New Zealand where he joined the police force. He is a senior sergeant, is m. and has issue.

Mary T. Fleming m. a Fogarty, parish clerk at Tuogh. Mary died at the birth of her first child. The child died also.

Kate T. Fleming m. in her f.f. Pat Mangan of Leamnaguilea. Issue – Tom, Maurice and Con. All are young and unm. at home.

Hannah T. Fleming m. Michael Liston, ex R.I.C. Issue – Mick and Kathleen, both young and unm.

Nell T. Fleming is m. in Killorglin.

Nora T. Fleming m. an O'Connor in America. They had two girls and a boy. Mr. & Mrs O'Connor are dead.

Margaret T. Fleming m. a Casey in America. They have one child.

Julia T. Fleming m. a Falvet at Beaufort. Issue - one child.

Tom T. Fleming is m. in England. Issue - one child.

Peter P. Fleming went to America. He too settled in Worcester and m. Elizabeth O'Connor a native of Fieries. Issue – John, Mary, Florence, William, Elizabeth and Julia.

John P. Fleming is in the newspaper business, unm.

Mary is a nun, Sr. Mary Modesta of St. Joseph's Order.

Florence is a stenographer in the U.S. Government Service.

William P. Fleming died when he was 3 years old.

Elizabeth P. Fleming m. Edward J. Taylor. They had one child who died when an infant. Julia P. Fleming is a nun, Sr. Elizabeth Frances of St. Joseph's Order.

James B. Cronin became a N.T. He taught for some years in the Tureencahill N.S. and then went to New Zealand.

Nano B. Cronin never m. She lived with the wife of her brother Bat, who died. Bat Cronin m. Margaret O'Keeffe of Mt. Infant, Co. Cork. Issue – Mary, Jane, Nora, Maggie, Bat, Bridget, Hugh, Sylvester and Julia.

Jane Cronin is a secondary teacher in Meath. Mary and Nora Cronin are nurses. The rest of the family are at home unm.

John and David Cronin went to America where they were m.

Kate Cronin m. Dan Hartnett of Knocknagree. Kate died and Dan m. secondly.

Sylvie Cronin m. Bessie Murphy of Laxie, Co. Cork. He bought a f. at Knockagree. Issue – Mary and Ellen.

Mary Cronin m. Tom Brosnan of Mausrour. Ellen Cronin is at home unm.

Maurice Cronin was for some years a station master at Midleton, Co. Cork and later was transferred to Maryborough. He m. Bridget Delaney of Maryborough. Issue – Bat, Martin, David, Michael, Marie and "Seatie".

As she was leaving she uttered the following wish: "that there may never again be such a crop in my field." For upwards of 60 years this field was not tilled but once, over twelve years ago. On that year there was a crop of potatoes, oats and turnips grown in it and the yield was so poor that it was not tilled since. Local opinion has it that this was the result of what the people of the place call "Jude's Curse". The field has not been tilled since.)

John O'Connor of Clydaugh came to this townland from Rathcommane, Ballyhar. He bought the Clydaugh farm from Maurice Kelliher and he m. Abbie Cahill of Knockahecane, Glenflesk. Issue—Mary, James, Kate, Ned, Ellie, Hannah, Dan, Jer, Abbie, Nora and John.
